

Tech Show opens on April 17

Benson Tech's 102nd Tech Show will run two days — April 17 and 18 from 6:00 – 9:00 PM. While this year's Tech Show will carry on a proud tradition, it will also showcase Benson Tech's recently modernized campus. Dedicated on September 14, 2024, the updated buildings have state-of-the-art equipment, technology and space for a 21st century career technical education (CTE). For Tech Show, the shops and labs will be open with "students strutting their stuff" and the courtyard buzzing with other CTE activities. Many clubs will be represented in the Commons, student-produced products will be on sale, and a variety of food options will be available.

Be sure to visit the new Alumni Room behind the balcony at the west end of the renovated auditorium (elevator available inside west entrance). Meet other alumni, update your contact information, and look at yearbooks.

For those curious, the first Tech Show was held May 16, 1919, for the public to see firsthand one of the country's first polytechnic high schools. It was an immediate success. With the exception of 1945 during World War II and 2020 and 2021 during the COVID-19 pandemic, Tech Show has been an annual event at Benson Tech. A somewhat scaled-back 100th event was celebrated during the school's sojourn on the former Marshall High School campus while the NE 12th Avenue building was being modernized from June 2021 through September 2024.

Benson Tech tightens its cell phone policy this spring

This past January, Portland Public Schools (PPS) announced a new cell phone policy for the coming 2025-2026 school year. That policy, which will be applied at all PPS K-12 schools, bans the use of cell phones within the school during school hours (Off and Away All Day). Since the start of this school year, Benson Tech's policy has been that students are not allowed to use their cell phones during class times but may use their phones at lunch and between classes. Benson Tech's policy has a set of escalating penalties for violations.

To prepare its students for the 2025-2026 district-wide cell phone policy, Benson Tech revised its existing policy on February 18 so that the first violation of a cell phone being used during class time, including in the hall, would result in the phone being taken and delivered to the main office, where the student can pick it up at the end of the day.

Benson Tech Foundation (BTF) update

In the absence of public funds, the Benson Tech Foundation (BTF), a qualified 501(c)(3) has provided "gap" funding. The charter of the foundation is to support the Career Technical Education (CTE) and Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) programs at Benson Tech. The BTF has proven to be a solid program gap funder to fill last-minute and planned needs of student project and club needs. Some recent examples:

- Funding for 2023 and 2024 calendar year Robotics Club programs to allow the kids to focus on their projects and compete, instead of spending time on fundraising. This has been fruitful. Robotics Club Team 267 competed at the State Championships on March 15 and 16. The team made it to double eliminations on the 16th, but lost both final competitions largely due to a lack of performance of their matched team. However, the individual performance of the Benson Tech team placed it in the 98.89th percentile based on its unique ability to succeed in the Endgame Ascent, whereby the team programs its robot to hang its entire unit from the highest rung of a ladder.
- Funding for 2022, 2023 and 2024 for the Health Occupations Society of America (HOSA) for health occupation students to attend the National Convention and to compete at Regional Competitions.
- Funding in 2025 for the Benson Auditorium Technical Staff (BATS) for needed headphones for stateof-the-art communications during plays and musicals and school events.
- Funding in 2024 for a 3D scanner to work with the new 3D printer in Applied Arts.
- Facilitating the transfer in 2022 of two Ford Model Ts so that they can be preserved for future use at Benson Tech events.

Our donors are Benson Tech alumni. A shout-out goes to Andrew Kern and his father Mike Kern, Roger Edwards, the Judith Seltz Charitable Foundation, and a number of non-Benson Tech alums who are Friends of Benson!

Sports update for Winter 2025

Winter Sports Recap

Benson Tech had a great winter season! The swim team had record-setting participation numbers, keeping our head coach Steve Espe very busy. Five of our swimmers entered into 11 district meet events at the end of the season. Fourteen Benson Tech students wrestled for their neighborhood schools this winter, including two who made it to the state tournament: Sadat Clowers, a senior who wrestled for Cleveland, and Gabi Trimble, a junior who wrestled for Roosevelt. Benson Tech's wrestling program will resume next winter.

Both the boys' and girls' basketball programs made it to the state playoffs. The boys finished their season 14-11, ranked 21st. They fell to #12, West Salem, in the first round of the playoffs. The boys' team did not have any seniors on the team this year, so we plan to have everyone back for another great season next year.

The girls' basketball team made it to the second round after beating Central Catholic 61-43 at home. Our girls finished the season with 21 wins and only five losses. The girls were eliminated from the playoffs in the second round by West Linn, who continued on to finish fourth in the state tournament. Benson Tech's last home game of the season, though it did not end with a win, was an eventful one with live singers performing "The Star-Spangled Banner" and "Lift Every Voice and Sing"; a DJ performing during breaks in play; and (most importantly) high-level basketball. The girls graduated one senior, post player Taliya McKelvey.



Both head basketball coaches were recognized by

their peers for their outstanding performance this season. Earl Clark, Benson Tech alumnus (Class of 1995), social studies teacher and the boys basketball head coach, as well as first-year head girls basketball coach Precious Alex were BOTH awarded PIL's Coach of the Year this season.

Spring Sports Forecast

The spring season is in full swing! The baseball and softball teams won their home openers at Buckman Field against their non-league opponents. The girls' and boys' tennis programs continue to grow in popularity with enough athletes to fill JV and varsity teams. Sophomore Carlyta Barfield is returning, hoping for another run in the state singles tennis tournament after making it to the quarterfinals last year as a freshman. Track and field kicked off the season with a league meet at McDaniel High School under first-year head coach and Benson Tech alumnus Duy Do (Class of 2012). There were standout performances by sophomores Rickeil Miles and Londyn Dyton in the 100-meter dash, juniors Larry Chesterfield and Tayshaun Schmidt in shot put, and junior Itzcoatl Ruiz Catalan in javelin.



Aminé Foundation Scholarship established for broadcasting majors

Hip-hop superstar Aminé (Adam Aminé Daniel, Radio Broadcasting Major, Class of 2012) has donated \$25,000 to KBPS for student scholarships. The Aminé Foundation Scholarships will be given out in five separate \$1,000 scholarships each year to radio broadcasting majors for five years, starting this year. KBPS staff has decided to tie four of these scholarships to the four existing KBPS Senior Awards for "Leadership and Professionalism," "Academic Achievement," "Best On-Air Announcer," and "Most Outstanding Contribution" to KBPS. The fifth Aminé Foundation Scholarship will go to a deserving student chosen by KBPS staff. The first Aminé Foundation Scholar was announced at the Benson Girls Basketball Game and Senior Night for Cheerleaders on Feb. 28. Senior Rosa Guerra was selected for the "Most Outstanding Contribution" award. Rosa was also being honored that evening for Cheerleader Senior Night with her family and friends in attendance.

Aminé has also very generously donated a free pair of his brand-new and extremely popular shoes (shown at right) to every Benson Tech senior of the Class of 2025. The shoes are a beautiful tribute to Benson Tech, in blue and orange colors, with a modified BPHS seal logo inside the shoe, and slogans like "Benson Tech," "Class of 2012" and "Radio KBPS" printed on the shoe's tongue. Previously, when the shoes were available to the public for \$120, they sold out

KBPS Summer Sound receives boost from donation

A former Benson Tech student, who wished to remain anonymous, donated \$5,000 to the KBPS student fund on February 17 to help the KBPS Summer Sound student job employment program and additional studio remodel cost. The Summer Sound program was started by KBPS staff in 1971. It pays students directly to operate the station and learn advanced broadcasting skills during the summer, and costs just over \$10,000 to operate.

The timing of the donation is fortuitous. It will help keep the program alive as KBPS staff continue to work to connect with individual donors for program support, including Phil Knight, whose generous personal donations in the past have kept Summer Sound active and thriving in recent years.

KBPS is also actively raising additional money to purchase broadcast industry standard furniture for its two broadcasting studios. The radio station was the last part of the Benson Tech campus modernization project to be finished. Requests for replacement of existing broadcast furniture in all KBPS studios were denied as the project was already over budget and delayed at that point. KBPS also was told that the existing broadcast furniture was not allowed to remain in place because it was not ADA-compliant – all "old" furniture was removed. KBPS did receive new broadcasting furniture for one of the studios, new audio mixing boards, and new microphones in the modernization updates.

Robotics Club goes to state tournament

The Robotics Club Team 267 (photo below) coached by Matt Pellico (former Benson Tech instructor) and lan Baldwin (former Club 267 team member) reached the Oregon State Championship Tournament final rounds on March 16, 2025. After surviving tough competition in early rounds, the team was selected as the fifth seed (of six) into a double elimination final tournament.

The challenge this year was to gather samples and specimens from a simulated underwater environment. Each team of two robots placed as many samples as they could into two nets (eight points each), and hung as many specimens as possible onto two horizontal rods (10 points each). A single match lasts only two and a half minutes. As an endgame challenge, each robot could



attempt to climb a two-rung ladder for up to 30 additional points.

Despite good performances, the Benson Tech team will not be one of

the four teams representing Oregon at the June International Tournament in Houston, Texas. Attesting to the team's skills, however, its robot, was

one of only two Oregon robots that were capable of a "third stage accent," i.e., being able to lift itself up to a third horizontal bar.

The Robotics Club's other team coached by John DeLacy (Class of 1966) did not make it to this year's Oregon State Championship Tournament, but it has in past

years. Most of the team's members are returning next year, and they are already enthusiastic about doing even better next season.

Bringing performing arts back to Benson Tech

Restoring Benson Tech's long history of performing arts was one of the voiced objectives during the multiyear planning effort leading to the 2021-2024 modernization of Benson Tech. The new main building indeed has a renovated auditorium with state-of-art light and sound equipment, new black box theater, and new band room with practice rooms. Unfortunately, Portland Public Schools' (PPS') operating budgets for 2024-25 or 2025-26 have not had the resources to staff a performing arts program in the modernized building.

Several groups of motivated, energized students have taken the lead in searching for short-term and longterm solutions. The Benson Auditorium Technical Staff (BATS), working with Principal Curtis Wilson, has found a new advisor in Heide Goertzen. They successfully hosted a free concert featuring the band, Almost Monday, back in December. They also recently hosted the first school-wide assembly in the renovated auditorium.

A new Music Club, also advised by Heide Goertzen, has formed to provide students a musical outlet. Its mission is to create space for Benson Tech students to make music and create a sense of belonging at the school through music. All forms are welcome; no one is turned away. Current goals include gaining access to PPS instrument rentals and possibly bringing in musicians to help coach the students. Principal Wilson nearly worked out a half-time band director, but it fell through. He remains committed to bringing music back to Benson Tech, but with PPS' budget woes, we are likely 1-2 years away from being able to afford it. In the meantime, the Benson Tech Site Council and BPHSAA are offering the club support and help in finding the club instruments, instructional help and other needed resources. Darrel Austin: From vocational student to one of America's most distinctive artists

Seventeen years after January 1925, when he became a Benson Polytechnic High School graduate, Darrel Austin was recognized nationally as a distinguished painter. His sold-out gallery exhibits produced articles in Esquire, LIFE, and Time magazines in 1942, and a continuing demand for his works. There are at least eight of his paintings in the Portland area: three in storage at the Portland Art Museum and five displayed in the Ram's Head Bar at Timberline Lodge.

Darrel was the second of three children born to Albert and Ella Austin. His parents were in Kansas during 1904 for the

birth of Darrel's brother Robert. Darrel was born in Raymond, Washington, on June 25, 1907, and his sister Dorothy was born in 1913. The family was found in Portland for the 1910 Census.

At Benson Tech, Darrel majored in printing, served on the staffs of both the Tech Pep and the Poly-Tech, the Fire Squad, Boosters, and the Executive Board. He is listed as an artist with the Poly-Tech, and was the advertising manager for the 1925 class play.

After graduation, Darrel enrolled in a series of drawing classes. The Sept. 6, 1927 issue of the Tech Pep includes Darrel's senior photo on the front page in an article noting he

had won a Chamber of Commerce poster contest heralding the beginning of the new merchandise opening. He won the \$50 prize for the previous year's celebration as well.

His art instructor at the University of Portland was Emil Jacques. Emil convinced Darrel to join him at the University of Notre Dame when he was offered a teaching position there. A Tech Pep alumni report in the Dec. 20, 1929 issue describes that journey to Indiana. The article also gives a description of Darrel's personality that fits in with the accounts in the Esquire and LIFE narratives. The writers who interviewed him

concluded that he had a high opinion of his work and of his wife, Margot, and himself. The two were content to limit their social circle to other believers.

Margot Helser was an Oregon native from Portland and fellow art student in the Notre Dame classes who caught Darrel's eye. They were married in Portland on 24 February 1933. They found a studio apartment and eked out a meager living, with Margot working with stained glass, and Darrel doing department store ads and whatever else that paid a wage.

The establishment of the Depression-era Works Progress Administration (WPA) in 1935 proved to be a milestone for Darrel's painting career. The WPA commissioned him for four murals for the Oregon Medical School in 1936, and the five Timberline Lodge paintings in 1937. The five depict *The Dishwashers, The Musicians, The Ironworkers, The Woodcutters*, and *Fish Story. The Ironworkers* is now called *The Skier.* (Shown below.) This change is appropriate for Timberline,

but note the square front ends of the skier's skis. Note too the diminishing elongation of the skier, a feature also seen in top-down views of tall buildings. There is no snow or ski poles, and ironworkers are often found walking on perpendicular I-beams.

Darrel's *Boy and Girl*, pictured above right, was painted early in the 1940s. Its sketch-like appearance is due to the application of paint with his palette knife rather than brushes. This technique of Darrel's is used in all his paintings and while it does not match the appeal of works from the High Renaissance, it does produce an element of charm. And a striking element in many of Darrel's pictures is the attitude of his subjects. The lad and the lass here are not of one mind, much like the two Dishwashers. His ability to perch on the arm of the chair and the limited space for his feet proclaim him gangly. The girl's distress is not from an inconsequential irritant. Could they be siblings? This painting is at the Portland Art Museum along with his *Portrait of a Girl* and *Picnickers*.

The WPA was disbanded in 1939 but Darrel's painting career was well under way by then. Painting proved to be a simpler task than selling the painted pictures. On a visit to Los Angeles, they had a query about his works and the resulting exhibition in January 1938 at the Putzel Gallery of Hollywood sold out. On to New York City, where Darrel pounded the pavement and painted, and Margot wrote and illustrated books for children. It was in the fall of 1940 before arrangements were

made for another one-man show at the Klaus Perl Gallery on 57th Street. It too produced a sellout and a cluster of additional gallery and museum exhibits in New York and beyond. In 1944, the Austins established a permanent residence in Connecticut and royalties from Margot's book contributed to their continued well-being. Her best seller was Peter Churchmouse. Margot died at their New Fairfield, Connecticut home on June 25, 1990, and Darrel followed her on Aug. 16, 1994. They are survived by their son, Darrel Jr.

Most of Darrel's paintings depict scenes from a parallel universe of a benevolent and mythical nature, viewed under a lunar sky. Girls and cats are his favorite subjects. Many of the works are variations of a central theme, each a little different from the others. His entire catalog of works can readily be found online. A few examples of these paintings, which accompany the magazine articles, will be displayed in the Alumni Room during Tech Show. Photos of the Portland-area pictures will also be displayed there. The Alumni Room is upstairs in the Auditorium, behind the balcony. Because there are events scheduled in the Auditorium, the doors at the west end of the building provide the best access.
