

On the evening of April 16 the June '37 class presented their class play entitled, "The Poor Nut." The play was presented to a huge audience and was met with enthusiastic approval.



# ACTIVITIES

A distinct aid to the Benson students in their student government and the developing of their personalities are the student activities. Under the careful supervision of the faculty, these activities have grown to be necessary to the proper functioning of the school as a whole. Only students who have participated in student activities can realize their importance, and it is with a tinge of regret that we leave our places in the school to take up another phase of life elsewhere. It is the sincere hope of every senior that the underclassmen will take our places in the activities and will carry on this work. The activities are as follows:

## LIBRARY COUNCIL

Composed of the student body president, secretary, and vice-president of the student body, editor of The Tech Pep, editor of the Poly Tech, president of the Orange "B", president of the graduating class, and three members from the student body at large, the library council has reduced the loss of books in the library to a minimum. The library council holds regular meetings in which they discuss improvements in the library. Miss Morrison, librarian, has charge of the council.

#### CANDY STAND

A constant source of revenue for the student body treasury is the candy stand. The proceeds aid in the purchasing of athletic equipment and the noon-day pictures. The stand is taken care of by four members of the student body. Mr. Holden is the faculty adviser.

#### TROUBADOURS

During the past three terms the membership of the Glee club has increased by leaps and bounds until it is now enjoying the largest membership in the history of the organization. The credit for the new spirit that has been instilled in the Glee Club is due to Mr. William Robinson Boone, their leader of the past three semesters. The Troubadours entertain at assemblies, at special recitals, and take part in broadcasts over radio station KBPS.

#### THE TECH PEP

The Tech Pep, Benson's school paper, is published weekly for the enjoyment of the students. Most of the members of the staff are students who have come to Benson with the idea of majoring in journalism. George Schreiber is the present editor-inchief, and Jerry Coates is managing editor of the publication. Mr. George Willis and Mr. George Henriksen are the advisers of the paper.

#### EXECUTIVE BOARD

Controlling the school government in Benson is the executive board. Under the leadership of the student body president, Carl Millerstrom, the board has enacted much legislation during the past term. The purchase of the pipe organ was the biggest piece of business accomplished this term.

#### MINUTEMEN

Under the supervision of Miss Craig, minuteman adviser, the minutemen sell tickets to entertainments held at the school and to athletic contests. Their biggest job is in the spring of each year when the minutemen conduct the Tech Show ticket sales.

#### CAFETERIA BOARD

The Cafeteria Board, which is composed of five student members elected by the executive board, meets regularly to plan menus and improvements in the cafeteria. Much credit is due this organization for the efficient way in which the cafeteria is run each noon. Faculty members of the board are Mr. Kuhns, Mr. Messing, and Mrs. Cupper, manager of the cafeteria.

#### AUDITORIUM CREW

The auditorium staff consists of the ushers, who seat the students at assemblies and noon-day pictures, members of the stage crew, who take care of the activities behind stage; and the boys who run the projection booth. Mr. Sieforth is in charge of the ushers, Mr. Tanner heads the stage crew; and Mr. Allingham is in charge of the picture booth.

#### STUDENT BODY OFFICERS

#### BENSON BAND

The Benson band, under the direction of Mr. Ferris, is composed of approximately thirty-five students. The band plays for assemblies, home basketball games, and many special programs over radio station KBPS.

#### BENSON ORCHESTRA

Benson's orchestra practices daily under the direction of Mr. Ferris. The orchestra studies different styles of music such as waltzes, fox trots, overtures and light symphonies. The musical body plays at class plays and at special programs over radio station KBPS.

## FIRE SQUAD





# THE ORGAN

April third of this year marked the culmination of another outstanding achievement of the Benson Polytechnic School Student Body in the dedication of the great Kimball Organ. This organ with its multiplex manual offers an immeasurable boon to the future students of Benson. The class of June, 1937, realizes the importance of an interest in the works of the great masters of the past both in music and in literature. Because of the stress of modern life, few really great musical compositions are produced today and symphony orchestras and choral groups are obliged to program

and re-program the relatively few classics.


To the person who is schooled in composition and who understands the voicing and instrumentation of the great works, so many things of beauty and interest are involved that no matter how often these masterpieces are played, beautiful themes and lovely melodies present themselves anew. To the layman who has not had the opportunity to study harmony and composition, a great overture of symphony is often simply a din of meaningless sounds. If these laymen knew of the beautiful sentiments and significant circumstances that inspired the great masters to produce their works, each of the golden threads of music interwoven to form the shining pattern of these magnificent tapestries of sound would present themselves most vividly, and admiration and interest would be profound.

Is there a member of the present Benson student body or will there ever be a member of the student bodies of the future who would not enjoy hearing the dramatic story of William Tell, told by an eloquent speaker, with the many inspirational effects of the oboes, flutes, tympanies, basses, and French horns, ably demonstrated by this wonderful organ, as an accompaniment? There is no doubt that the soulstirring music of Gioachino Rossini inspired by the story of William Tell, distinguished patriot and chief instrument of the revolution which delivered the Swiss Cantons from the German yoke early in the thirteenth century, would present a pic-

ture of significance and interest.

In the works of the more modern masters bold steps have been taken in both harmonies and themes, and the whole tone scale has been added to the twelve tone scale of Rossini's time. Some strikingly beautiful modern compositions have heen based on this new scale. It is a deplorable fact, however, that some of our present day music teachers hold up their hands in horror at a modern composition that has departed from the traditional twelve-tone scale and from the simple rhythms of 4-4, 2-4, 3-4 and 6-8 tempos of bygone days. When Claude Achille Debussy presented his modernistic composition involving 5-2 tempos and was even so bold as to lean toward the whole tone scale, his music was frowned upon and famous leaders scorned his bold departures in the hitherto untouched fields of harmony, theme, and rhythm.

The United States is perhaps the only nation without a wealth of modern folk lore and songs. Many great orchestra program compositions are based on the beautiful folk lore of modern Austria, Norway, Ireland, and, in fact, most of the other countries of the world with the exception of the United States. Is it possible that a country with as great an individuality and personality—created, of course, by the intermingling of many races—shall not be entitled to its folk songs and lore so dear to the hearts of our cousins across the sea? Many a person with what he considers a musical education looks with scorn on most of our modern American compositions, calling them "Jazz," simply because they are based upon a scale and rhythm unfamiliar to him. The word "Jazz" could well be used to distinguish the discordant efforts of certain groups of the younger generation, who, with a few instruments of torture, produce weird sounds that have no particular rhyme, rhythm or reason, from the many beautiful compositions based on the characteristics and emotions of our modern people. Our great Kimball can be used to educate the older generation to appreciate and understand the modern compositions based on the lives and traditions of our new world just as effectively as it can be used to educate our young people to appreciate the works of the great masters of bygone days.

# CLUBS

## AQUATIC CLUB

Swimming has long been denied the students of Portland high schools as an interscholastic sport, possibly because the high schools have no tank in which to practice. This, however, did not stop a few progressive students who started one of the newest clubs in Benson. Mr. B. E. Badley is the adviser for the club.

## ARCHITECTURAL CLUB

Founded by students majoring in Architectural Drawing, this club has proved most popular, and has been designed to give the student an insight into drawing beyond the regular course. Each year the club holds contests in designing houses, and the winning designs are displayed at the Tech Show each year. Mr. V. G. Wild is the adviser.

## AUTOMOTIVE ENGINEERS

This club was founded for the purpose of increasing interest and furthering education in the auto-mechanic trade. The club has speakers at different times throughout the term, and members of the club are taught things which will prove useful to them in their chosen vocation. Mr. C. V. #### AVIATION CLUB

#### CAMERA CLUB

One of the most popular clubs in Benson is the Camera club. The club possesses all the facilities for the developing of pictures. They have a dark room, printer, developer, dryer, and enlarging machine. The members at their exhibit in the Tech Show explain the principles of photography to the customers. They also put on other exhibits along the line of photography which have proved extremely popular. Mr. Raisig advises the group.

#### CAVALIERS

Although not a letter sport, fencing is most popular here at Benson. The Cavaliers club in a competitive meet with other fencing teams of the city won the city championship. The club also possesses the city individual champion, Terrill Cripe. Their fencing skill is most extraordinary, considering the fact that they have no coach or instructor. Each year the club draws large crowds to exhibition matches which are fought in the gym, at Tech Show time. Mr. Strickland is the club adviser.

### ELECTRIC CLUB

The Electric Club was organized by a group of electric students to further know-ledge in their trade. The club has one of the most interesting displays in the Tech Show, their Tesla Coil. They draw many spectators to see hundreds of millions of volts travel through a boy's body and do him no harm. The Electric club experiments and studies high frequency electricity. Their adviser is Mr. Brereton.

After a short lay-off the Gym Leaders club has reorganized and is now enjoying the largest membership of any club in the school. The club's roster totals sixty-five. The Hi-Y is not a Benson club, and their adviser is not a member of the Benson faculty, but it is one of the most active clubs in the school. The purpose of the club is to build and maintain high Christian character in the school.

The Machinist Club is composed entirely of students taking the Machine course, and the purpose of their organization is to increase their knowledge of their trade. They frequently have visitors at their meetings to make addresses, and sometimes this club sponsors films shown in the auditorium. Mr. Cross advises the group.

#### ORANGE "B"

Only students who have earned a letter in sports are admitted to this organization. The purpose of the club is to create and maintain high ideals of sportsmanship around school. The club sponsors intershop baseball and basketball. Mr. Drynan acts as the adviser.

#### OYER-UN-GON CLUB

Students who belong to the Oyer-Un-Gon club are advocates of the popular sport of hiking, and the club was organized for the purpose of hiking. The club takes many hikes around the state of Oregon, viewing much of Oregan's beautiful scenery. Each year the club puts on some sort of display on wild life for the Tech Show. 



# BASKETBALL

With a total of 11 games won against 14 lost for the entire season, an inexperienced squad of fighting hoopsters, for the first time under the new Tech mentor, Coach Fred J. "Lefty" Marineau, represented Benson in the hoop wars for the 1936-37 season. Frank Marchi, only member of last year's championship ball club, was the lone veteran around whom Coach Marineau built his first Benson basketball team, and it was indeed a team of which any school could be proud, even though it won no championships. This squad scored a total of 532 points in its twenty-five games, for an average of 21.28 points per game, while their opponents scored 589 points for an average of 23.16 points per game. Frank Marchi, who has been a regular forward on three consecutive Benson hoop machines, two of which won championships, paced the 1936-37 aggregation in every game, and was awarded an all-star rating for the second consecutive year in return for his efforts.

The Mechanics played 11 pre-season practice games before the regular season started, winning five and losing six. The results of these games in the order played are as follows: Benson 22, St. Stephens 18; Benson 22, Bradford Juniors 33; Benson 32, Astoria 27; Benson 36, Northwestern School of Commerce 16; Benson 16, Reed College 30; Benson 15, Vancouver 19; Benson 21, Culver Glass 19; Benson 20, Reed College 14; Benson 15, Astoria 30; Benson 16, Astoria 24.

The Grant Generals were the first opponents of the Tech machine in regular league play, and after a game which was see-saw all the way the Grantonians put on a last-quarter spurt to win 30 to 25. Spiker and Edwards let the G-Men in scoring, while Marchi and Angelus, diminutive forward, paced the Techs.

The Mechanics' first victory of the season in regular league play was at the expense of the Commerce Stenogs, when the Penpushers went down to a 23 to 19 defeat in the Tech's second start. Kenny Boehmer, Benson guard, went on a scoring spree in this game to ring up 7 points to lead his team in scoring, while Stremick paced the Stenogs with 10.


By far the worst defeat of the season, or any other season as far as that is concerned, was crammed down the Mechanics' throats by the Lincoln Cardinals, whose famed zone defense clicked with such unerring precision that not one field goal was recorded by the Bensonites during the entire game. Meanwhile the Wright-men were ringing up 21 points for a final score of 21 to 5, five free throws having been potted by the Techs in their third game of the season.

With the entire Jefferson team hitting the basket at will, the Techs were an easy mark for the Democrats in their next game, and when the final count was tabulated it was found that the score showed the Jeffmen on the long end of a 30 to 17 count.

A four-game winning streak, longest of the season, was started by the Techs at this point of the season, with Roosevelt, Grant, Commerce, and Washington going down before the Tech barrage in the order named. Playing on their own floor and with a desperate desire to break their 50-odd game losing streak, the Teddies proved formidable opponents for the Techs, but finally went down to defeat before the "bombing" of Frank Marchi, who scored 12 of his team's 27 points, while the Roughriders were garnering 22 for themselves. A revenge victory over Grant followed the Roosevelt tussle, and when the smoke of battle from the sixth game of the season had cleared away, the count was seen to stand at 28 to 23 in Benson's favor. Marchi again led his team-mates in this game, scoring another even dozen points. Another victory, the second of the season over the Commerce Stenogs, was the result of the seventh game of the season, the score favoring Mr. Marchi and Co. by a 25 to 13 margin of victory, while the eighth game of the season, played against Washington, furnished the fourth and final win of the series. The final score was 28 to 16, Benson, with Marchi coming through to lead both teams, scoring ten points.

The pesky Lincoln Cardinals, who had blasted Benson hopes once before, handed the Techmen in their second encounter a decisive 26 to 13 lacing, following which the Franklin Quakers, league champions, barely edged out a 23 to 21 victory in the final seconds of play. Strange though it may seem, after giving the champions the scare of their young lives, the Techmen then took at the hands of the Jefferson Democrats a sound and unquestionable two-to-one trouncing. The final score favored the Jeffersons by 36 to 18, and in their next start, against the hapless Roosevelt aggregation, the Techs won their final game of the season by a 29 to 24 score. In what proved to be the closest and most thrilling ball game of the entire schedule, the Washington Colonials edged out the Benson Techmen in the final seconds of their furious tussle to take a 35 to 34 victory in the next to the last game of the season. Eldon Gregg, Marchi's running mate at forward, led both teams in scoring in the Washington melee with 11 counters.

The Mechanics closed the season with a real exhibition of basketball as it should be played when they engaged the Franklin Quakers before a packed gym with the championship of the league at stake. For three whole quarters these two teams battled neck and neck, with Marchi time and again keeping his team in the running with perfect passes, dribbling, goals; and it was not until the final seconds were ticking away that the Quakers nosed out a two-point lead and then increased it to four as the gun sounded with the final score standing at 22 to 18.



# SOCCER

With an unblemished record of four wins, four ties, and no defeats, Benson's 1937 edition of championship soccer teams as coached by that wily Scot, Coach Gilbert Drynan, won for the tenth time the crown which represents the championship of the Interscholastic soccer league. It was no new experience, this winning a soccer championship under Coach Drynan, for ten times in the last 16 years a Drynan-coached team has won the league championship.

This year's team started the season with a close-checking game against the Stenogs of Commerce. The two teams battled furiously, without either squad gaining an edge during the hour. Meeting the Jefferson Democrats and the Roosevelt Teddies in their next two starts, Benson's battling Mechanics duplicated their first performance by chalking up scoreless ties. Edging out the Generals of Grant by a score of 2 to 1, the Techmen kept their slate clean.

Starting the second half against the Commerce Stenogs, the men of Drynan proceeded to resort to their old habit of playing tie games, and this one ended with the count knotted at 1-all. The Jeffmen were next to feel the power of the Tech attack, and fell before a barrage of two goals which left the final score showing 2-0 Benson. The Roosevelt Roughriders lived up to their reputation by riding a very rough road against the Techmen, and when the playing time had elapsed the Mechanics were ahead by a score of 1 to 0. Coming into the home stretch tied for first place with the pesky Commerce Stenogs, Benson's Mechanics met the Grant Generals on Buckman field in a game played on a sea of pure mud, and won the championship of the league on a goal by Ed Grassley on a pass from Bob Domenico. The final score favored Benson by a 1 to 0 count, Grassley's goal proving the margin of victory which won the championship.

## WRESTLING

Sufficient adjectives are not contained in Webster to describe the achievements of Coach Al Gibson and his 1937 wrestling team in developing a green squad of inexperienced matmen into the Northwest champions and winners of the Oregon A. A. U. tourney at Multnomah Club. With a nucleus of only six grapplers from last year's championship squad upon which to build his 1937 machine, Coach Gibson again proved himself a wizard by developing a team which triumphed over the best high school teams in the Northwest and then went on to win the A. A. U. championship against college and amateur competition.

The Techmen entered the Oregon State High school meet, and for the third time in four years came out second best. Salem High took first honors, while Benson took second. Phillips, 165 pounds, and Cavagnaro, 175 pounds, won championships.

Although given little if any chance of repeating their performance of last year in winning the Northwest championship at Camas, the Tech team completely upset the dope bucket by winning the championship from a large field which included 15 teams and 175 grapplers. The Tech squad placed 6 men in the semi-finals. The weights, and final standings of the six Techmen who won awards are as follows: Shido, 95 pounds, took second; Nishikawa, 115 pounds, won a championship; Schlappi, 115 pounds, took second; Wallace, 135 pounds, won a championship; Phillips, 165 pounds, won a championship; Cavagnaro, 175 pounds, won a championship.

The Bensonites closed one of the most successful seasons in Tech wrestling history by winning the Oregon A. A. U. meet. The Tech team scored an almost incredible triumph in winning 5 out of 9 events and taking second in another. Schlappi, Arai, Nishikawa, Phillips, and Cavagnaro were crowned champions and awarded trophies, and Whitbeck received a gold cup for being runner-up to Arai.

# TRACK

Coach Harry H. Hargreaves, who last year coached his track team to the state high school championship, found little veteran material answering his call for track this year, and as a result has had to be content with mostly second and third places rather than the first places won by his 1936 aggreation. In the first important meet of the year, the Hill Relays held at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition pavilion, the Grant G-Men walked off with everything in sight, and the Techmen had to be content with a fourth place. The only event in which the Techs placed was the distance medley, in which Bob Domenico led all the way only to be edged out at the tape by Jim Monroe of Grant.

The only meet won by the Techs at the time of publication of The Poly Tech was the annual Washington-Hill-Vancouver-Benson Quadrangular affair, in which the Techs edged out Washington by a score of 50.5 points to 46.5. In this meet Bob Domenico pulled an "iron man" stunt by winning the mile and placing second in the half, while Hunziker and Plummer monopolized the sprint events. Hunziker took first in the 220 and second in the 100, while Plummer took first in the 100 and second in the 220. Ted Burns did his part for the Tech cause by winning the 440-yard dash.

Grant's conquering Generals performed in expected style when they walked off with first place in both the Vancouver Relays, held under the lights at Vancouver, Washington, and the Portland relays.

Benson placed third at Vancouver and fourth at city meet. The Tech juniors won fifth place in city junior meet. City and state meets remain.

# BASEBALL

Suffering from a consistent inability to hit in the pinches, Benson's 1937 baseball team at the time this copy was written was far down in prep league standings with a pair of wins against five defeats. Coach Fred J. Marineau, serving his first season as mentor of a Tech diamond squad, was handicapped from the start by a lack of veterans in nearly every position, and as the season wore on, this lack of experience became especially noticeable in this inability to score when the outcome of the game was at stake. Another handicap suffered by all the teams in the league this year was the unwillingness of Jupe Pluvius, the rain god, to stop operations long enough for the teams of the league to play their scheduled games. As a result six games at the first of the season were postponed because of wet grounds.

Franklin high school, following a series of postponements, was the first team to cross bats with the Mechanics, and after a close struggle all the way emerged with a 9 to 7 victory. Eldon Jenne's Washington Colonials won the second game of the season from the Techs by a score of 6 to 4, but in their next start—against the hapless Roosevelt Teddies—the Marineau-men won their first game by a score of 8 to 1 behind the airtight pitching of Frank Marchi, Grant high school always a diamond title threat, next opposed the Bensonites, and took home a 3 to 0 win, following which the Lincoln Cardinals, last year's title winners, took a 5 to 0 decision from the Benson squad. Marchi, pitching his second league game, held the Commerce Stenogs to 3 runs while his team mates collected 11 to win their second league game. In the last game before the date of printing The Poly Tech, the Jefferson Democrats, league-leading team, unmercifully trounced the Mechanics to the tune of 14 to 3.


## GOLF

Handicapped by an injury which prevented Kenneth Boehmer, who was scheduled to play number 2, from participating in any matches Benson's golf team had failed to win any of their first three matches at the time this article was written. Coached by Mr. Messing, the Mechanic divot-diggers lost their first match to the Commerce Stenogs by a margin of 8 to 4. Norman Parsons, number 1 man, made one-half point; David Fry, number 4, made 3 points; and Reuben Gunst, number 2, duplicated Parson's feat in scoring one-half point.

In their second match, played against Jefferson, the Techs halved the points at 6-all. Parsons won 2, Mitchell Heineman, replacing Fry at number 4, won 1, and Carlson was high-point man with three counters.

Rated an excellent chance of scoring their first win over the Lincoln Cardinals, their next opponents, the Mechanics suffered an unpleasant surprise when "the worm turned" and took a close  $6\frac{1}{2}$  to  $5\frac{1}{2}$  victory from the oft-defeated Techmen. In this match Parsons scored one-half point, Gunst garnered 3, Heineman took one and a half, and Carlson took one-half.

For the benefit of those not accustomed to golf team play, the scoring system is as follows: one point is awarded for each nine holes won by a player, and one-half point is awarded each player in case the nine holes are halved with each player having the same score. In case one player wins both nines, he is awarded an extra point for winning the eighteen-hole match. All matches in the Portland prep league are played on the Eastmoreland course.

## **TENNIS**

With an unblemished record of three wins against no defeats at the time this book went into publication, Benson's 1937 edition of tennis teams as coached by Coach Leo Oldright was off to a flying start in an attempt to re-capture the Oregon State high school tennis championship won last year. The Franklin Quakers, with Chuck O'Neal number 1 high school player in the city, as their chief threat, were scheduled to meet the Techs in the season's first match, but because of unfavorable weather conditions this match was postponed and the Jefferson Democrats were the first to oppose the Mechanics. Both singles matches and the doubles were won by the Bensonites in their encounter with the Jeff-men. Harold Jungck, number 1 man, defeated Keating of Jefferson in the first match by winning the first set 6-2, and then coming back after dropping the second 8-6 to win the third and deciding set by a score of 7-5. Richard Jungck, Harold's brother and number 2 man, defeated Kler of Jefferson by a decisive score of 6-1, 6-0.
