"Howdy Stranger"

The June '38 Class Play, "Howdy Stranger" was presented to a large audience in the school auditorium the night of March 18, and was considered to be one of the best ever presented by a senior class.

Elly Jordan, played by John Trapman, a young New Yorker with extraordinary singing ability, was on his way to the coast when he came to Hardy's Dude Ranch in Cody, Wyoming. He was induced to stay by Jane Hardy, (Muriel Strellman), and the romantic side of the play began. Roy Chadwick, a radio producer played by Thomas Hughes, heard Elly's voice and induced him to go back to New York to sing on the radio as "Wyoming Steve Gibson." All went well until Sam Thorne, Elly Jordan's rival, played by Robert Buckbee, told the newspapers that Gibson was not a real cowboy. In the effort to prove Steve a real cowboy, Ma and Pa Hardy (Barbara Boucher, Dick Chapman) are called in and coached to produce the proper answers. Ma had a little trouble when the reporters came for the showdown, and to top it all Elly Jordan's real parents appeared on the scene. The reporters are overpowered and are locked in a room in Elly's apartment. Jeff Hardy, played by Jim Primmer, adds to the hilarity by cutting up throughout the play.

Elly has inherited from his father a fear of any kind of animal. Once Elly climbed to the roof of Hardy's ranch house when he saw a horse; another time a canary bird was the cause of a panic in his room. As the famous cowboy, "Wyoming Steve Gibson," Elly, astride a horse, was to present the bull-dogging trophy at the rodeo, but because of his fear for animals this seemed impossible. Professor Landis (Boyd Lee) comes to the rescue by hypnotizing Elly to make him ride a horse. The act was so good that Elly becomes a fearless cowpuncher of superhuman ability and goes to the rodeo, forces the bull-dogger from his mount, chases the bull himself, and throws the animal in a new record time. This proves without doubt that Elly really is a cowboy. The play ends with Elly back in his natural mind and ready to marry Jane Hardy who started him on his troubled road to fame and fortune.

Class History

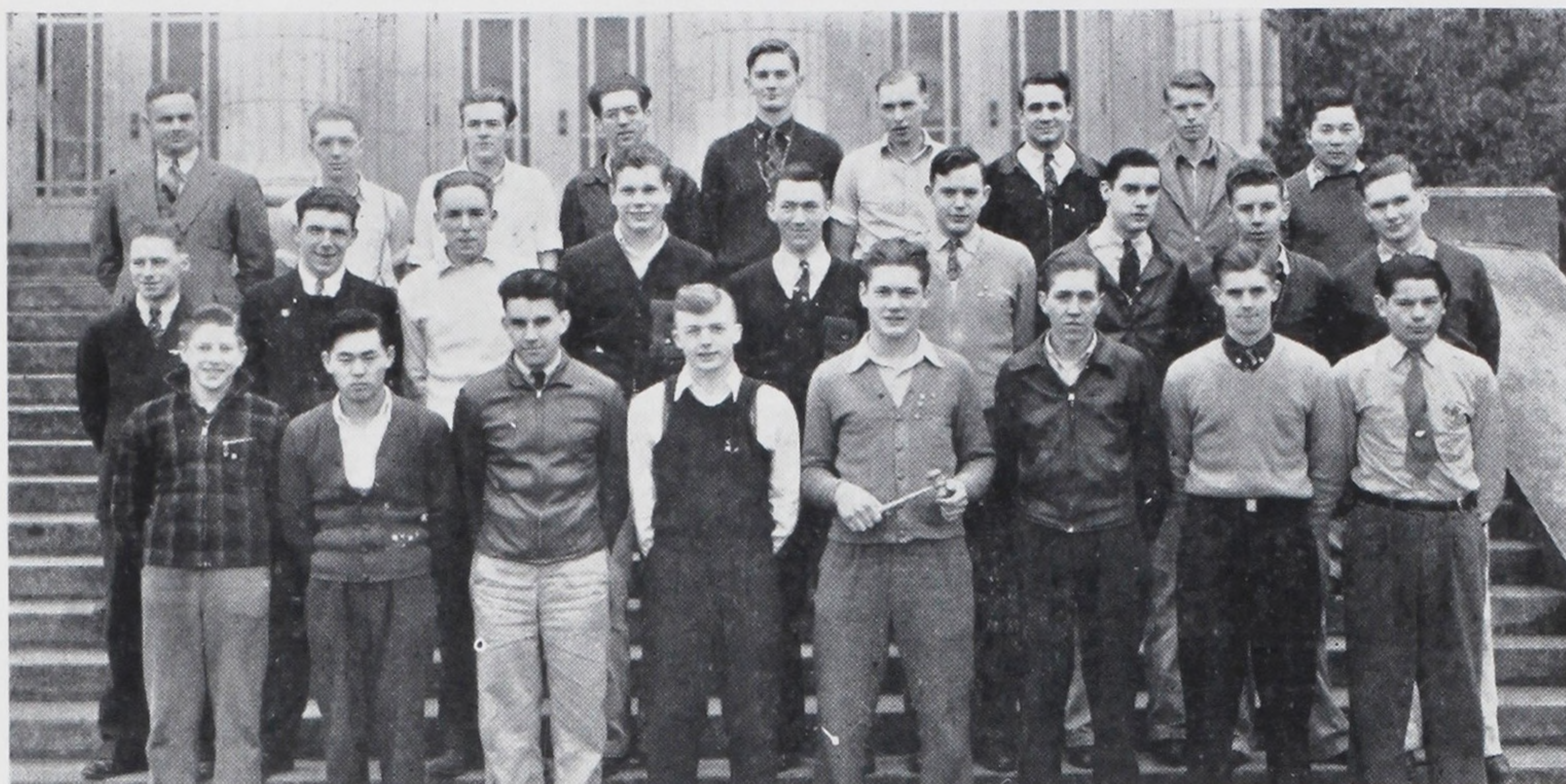
AQUATIC CLUB

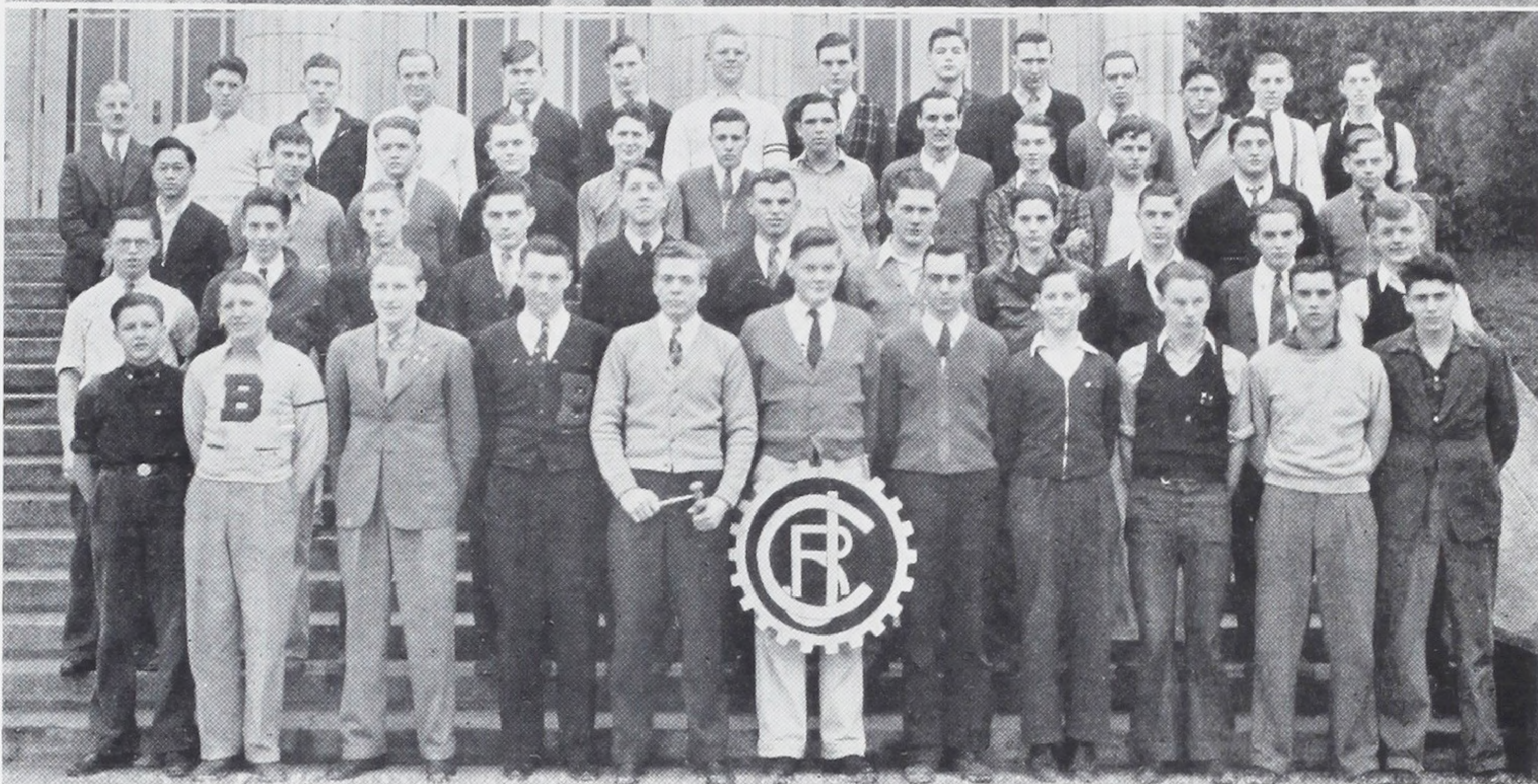
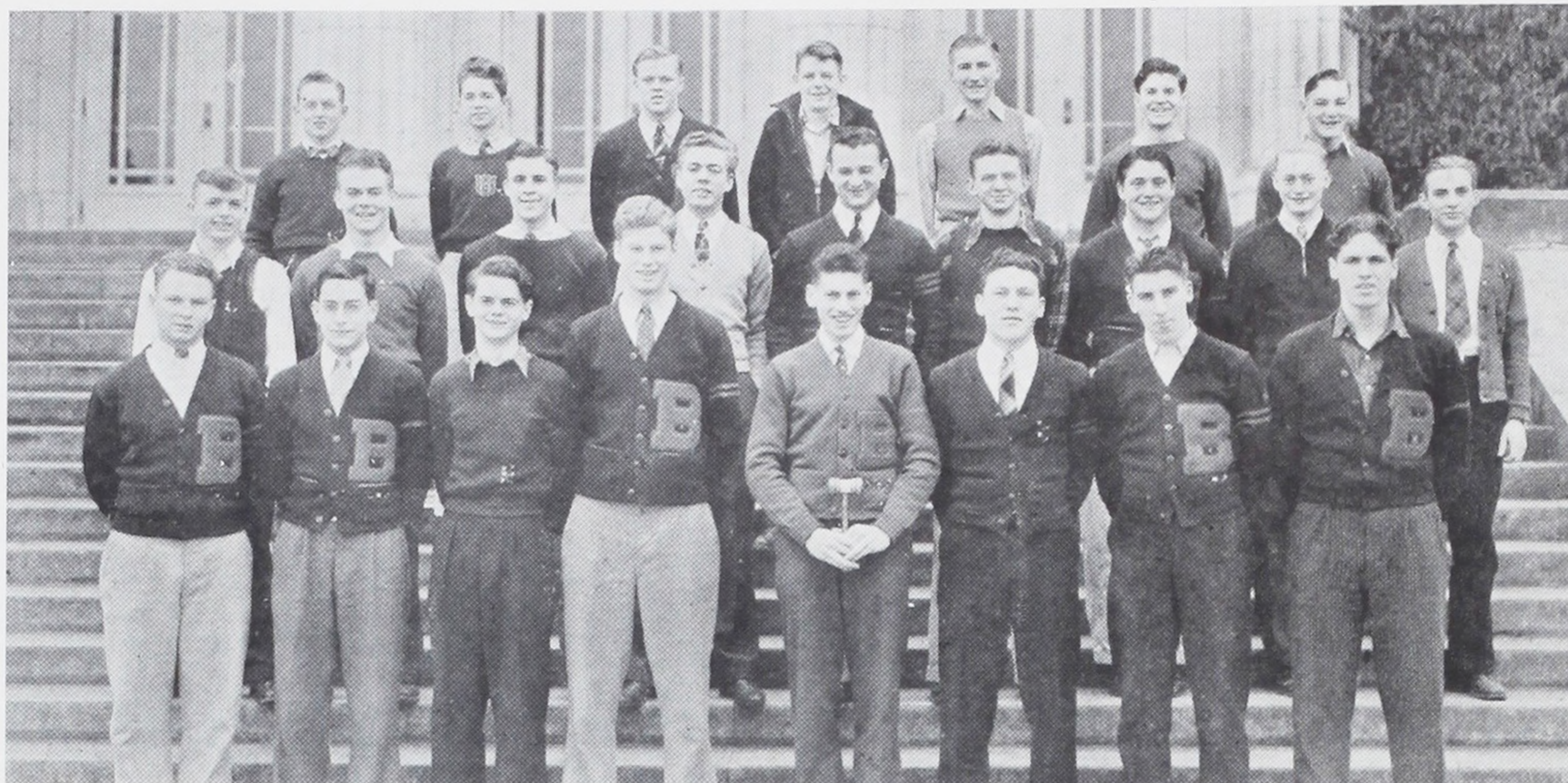
BENSON AUTOMOTIVE ENGINEERS

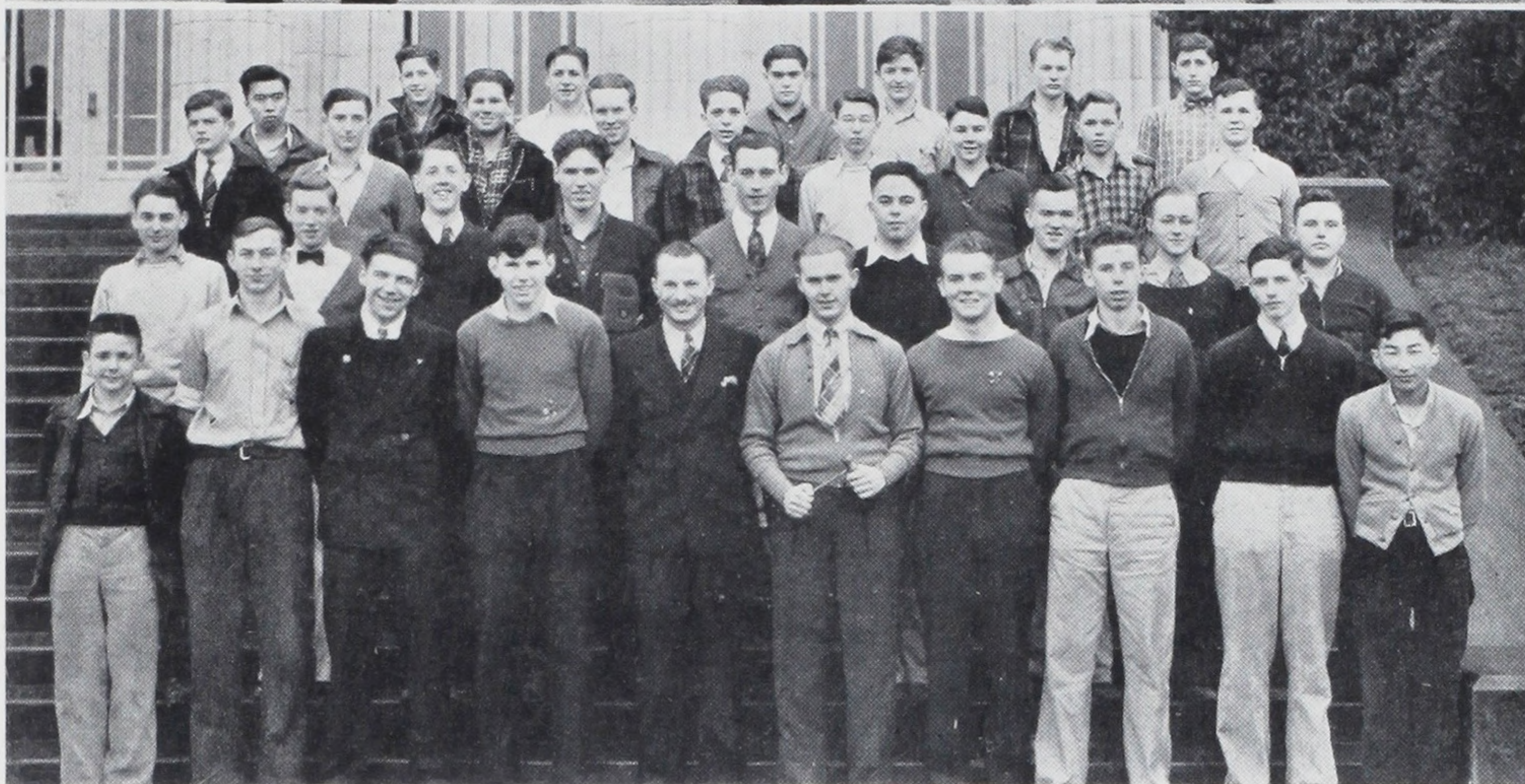
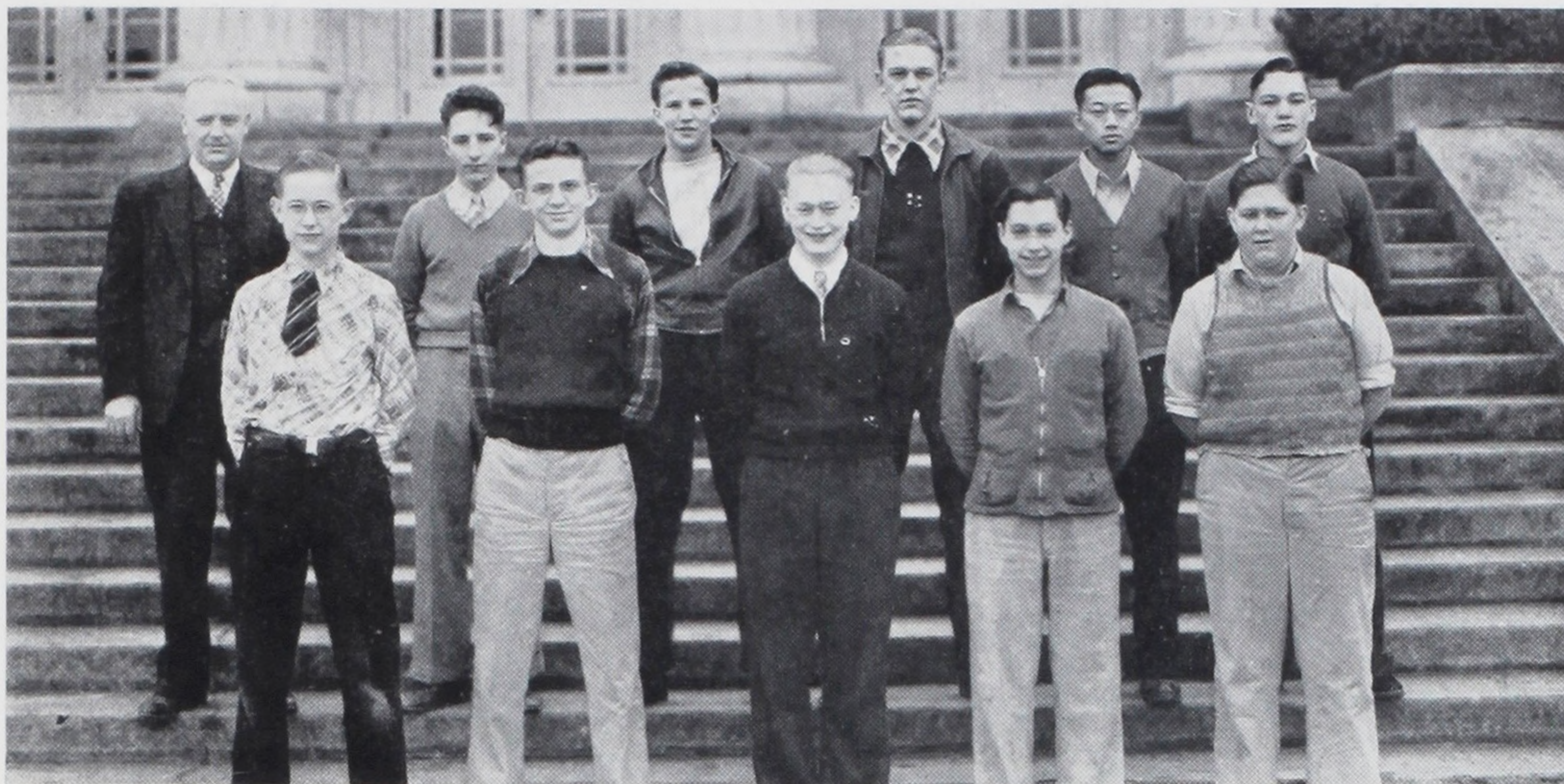
RADIO ACTORS' GUILD

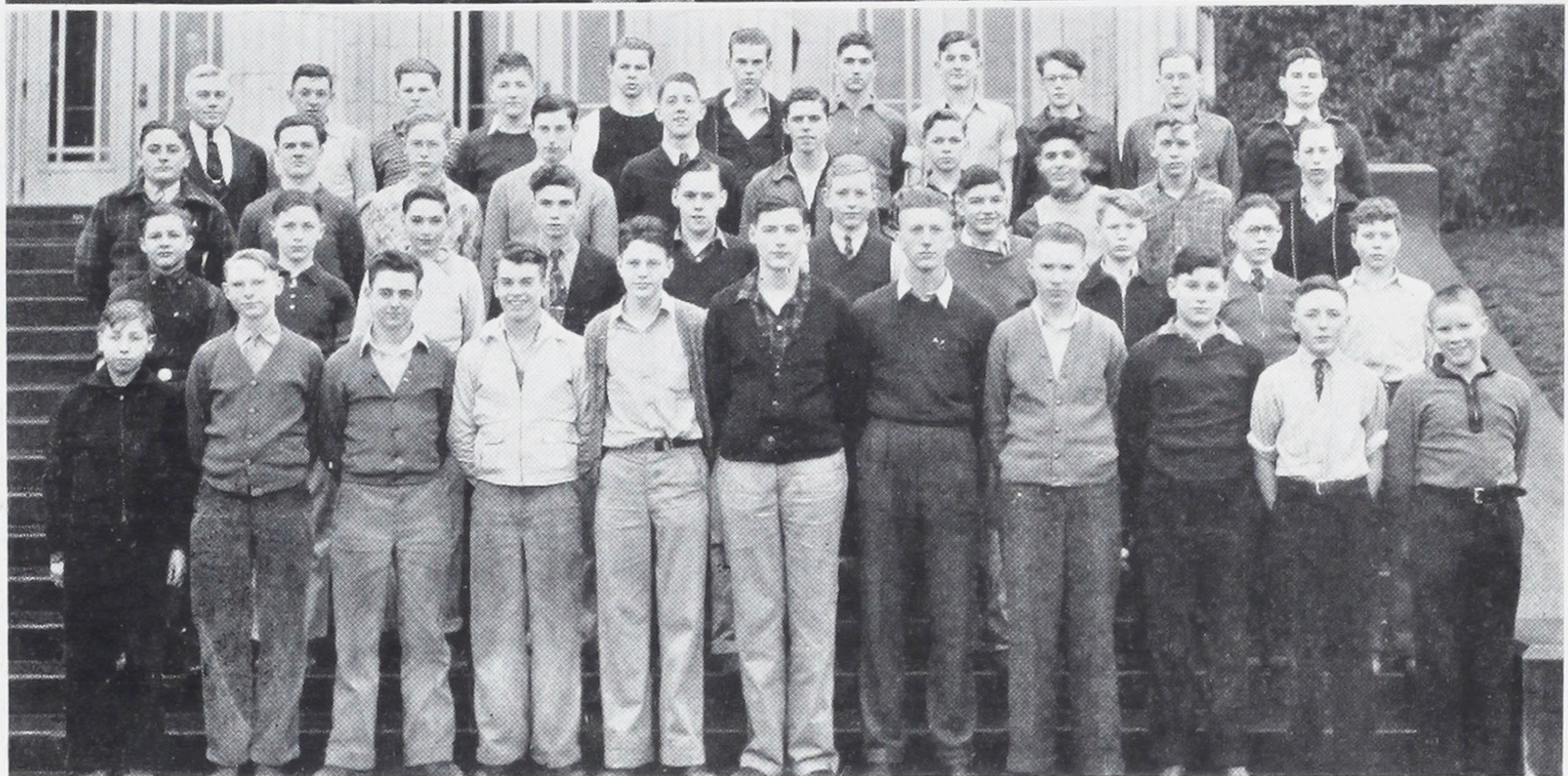

THE AUDITORIUM STAFF

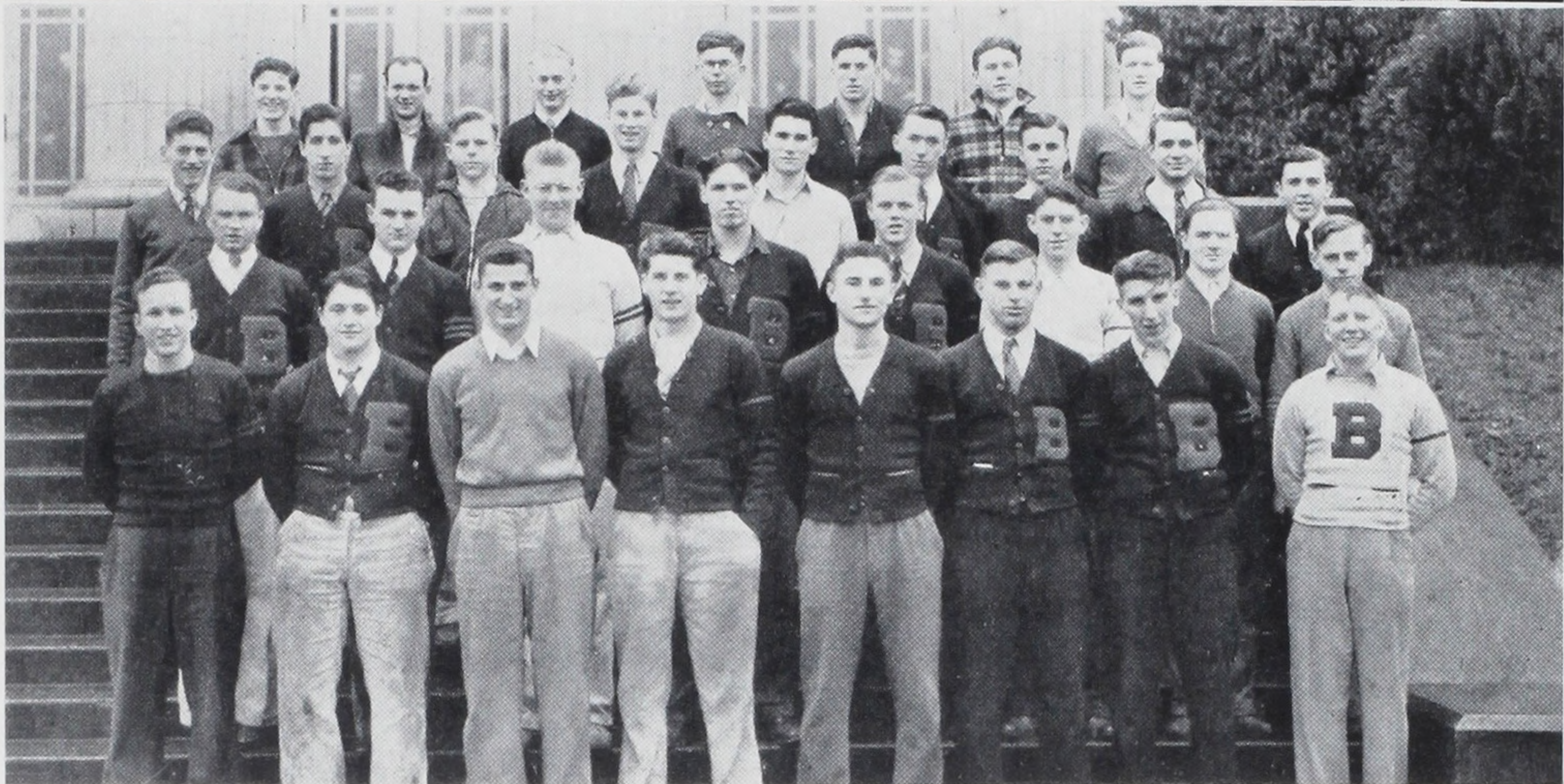
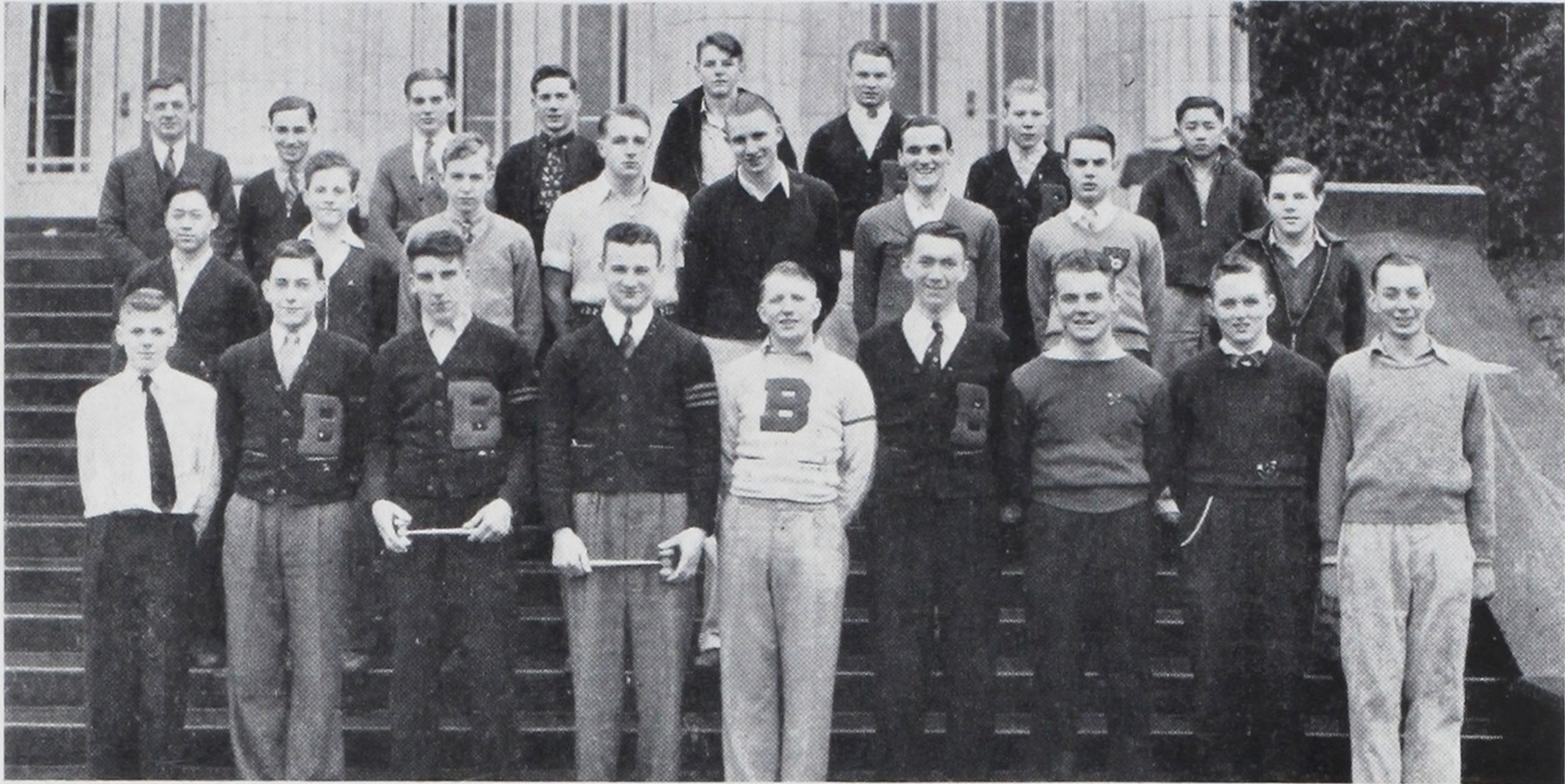

FIRST AID

Four students are chosen from each shop by the various instructors to take first aid each term. These classes are conducted by Mrs. Smith, the school nurse. The first aid course that the boys take consists of five parts: class work, bandaging, oral work, tests, and artificial respiration. The boys receive shop credits and a senior first aid diploma, if they pass the examination at the end of the term. First aid courses are necessary in Benson because so much large and complicated machinery is used. The American Red Cross First Aid Book is used for the course.

LIBRARY COUNCIL

A very definite and special service is rendered to the school by the Library Council under the competent direction of Miss Morrison, librarian. The council meets regularly to discuss the problems of the library. Since the start of the Library Council the number of books lost or stolen has decreased very much. 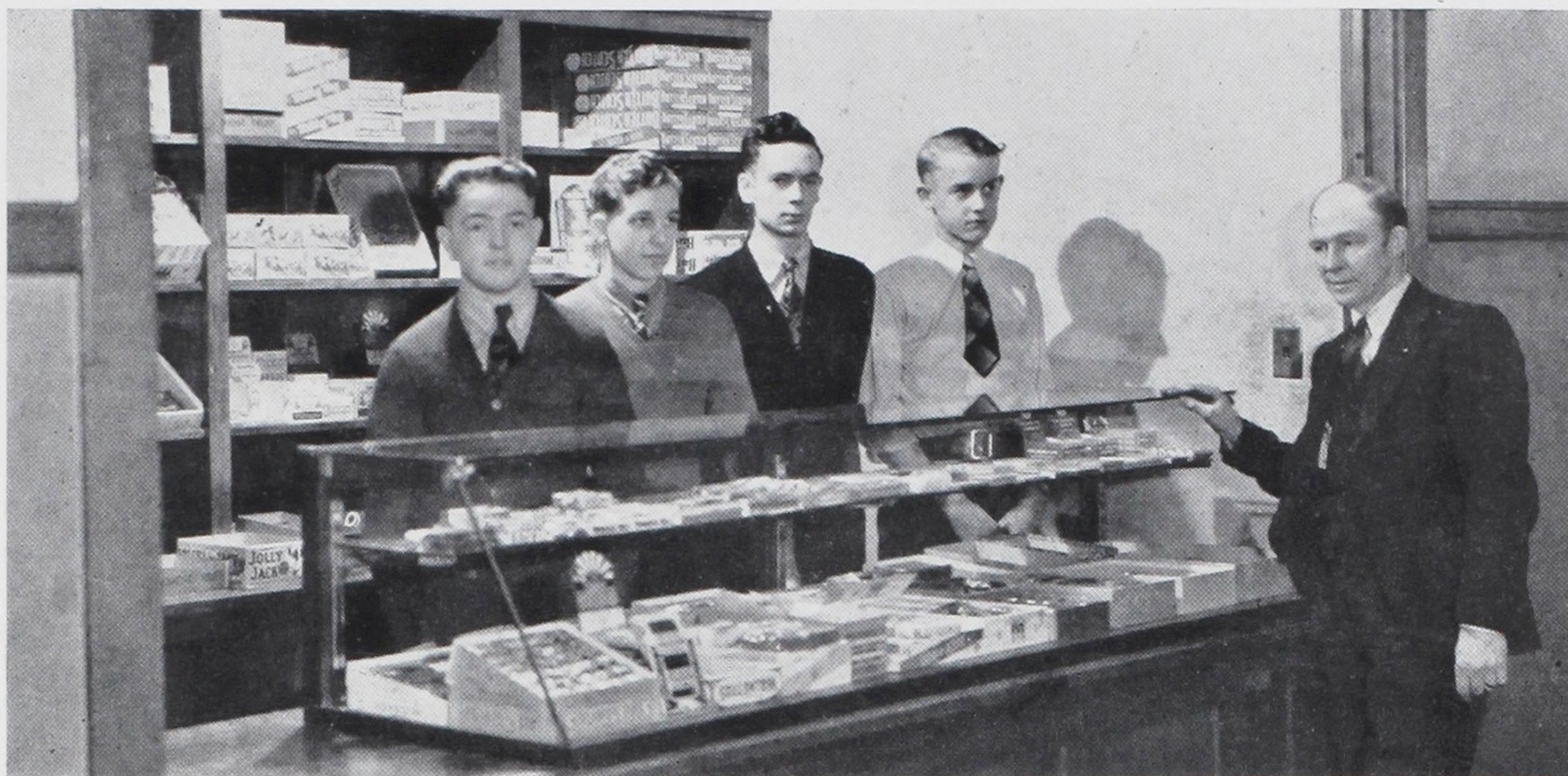

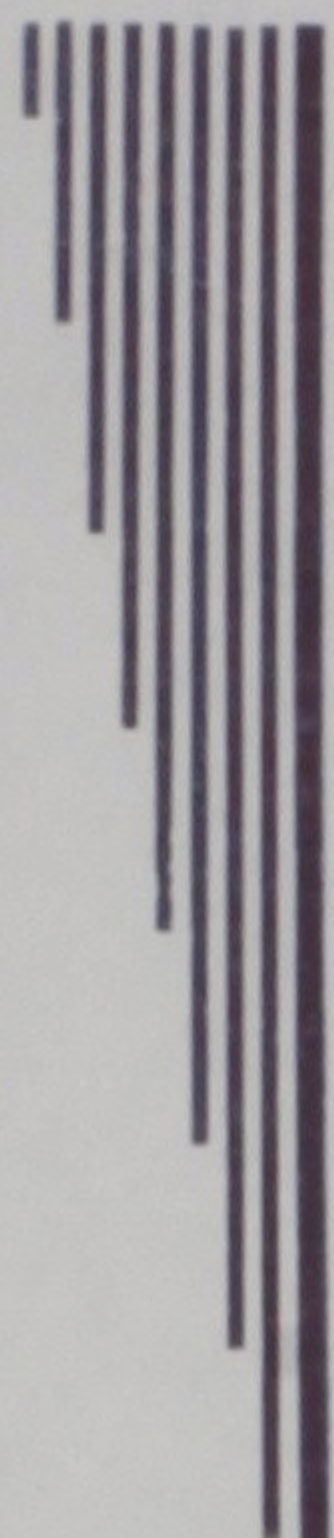

We will say very little about the next match which was against Grant high in which the Techmen were taken down the line like they did Roosevelt. Benson lost this match by three decisive defeats. Meeting next a powerful Lincoln squad, the racquet wielders lost a close match 2-1. Falling by the wayside for the second time, James Primmer and Richard Jungck lost both matches. Determined to come home with something more than sore arms, the doubles combination of Parker and Parker decisively won to bring home the final match. Next meeting the Washington Colonials, Coach Oldright's mighty proteges, determined to even up the losses, won a hard fought match, and finished up on the long end of a 2-1 score. Jungck won an easy victory over his opponent, while Primmer again suffered defeat by losing two straight sets. The Parker and Parker combination seems to be invincible, with the boys waltzing off with an easy one-two victory.

Basketball

The 1938 basketball team, although lacking considerably in experience, ended the season in the upper division, and made a fine showing for a squad composed largely of underclassmen. In this game the two returning lettermen, Rudy Vuksich and Howard Heym got behind their less experienced team mates to strengthen their offensive.

In a return pre-season game at Astoria the Techmen gave vengeance to their previous defeat by copping a thriller from the Fishermen 38 to 35.

The Portland Interscholastic league games got under way January 14, with Benson playing host to Lincoln. Benson suffered defeat.

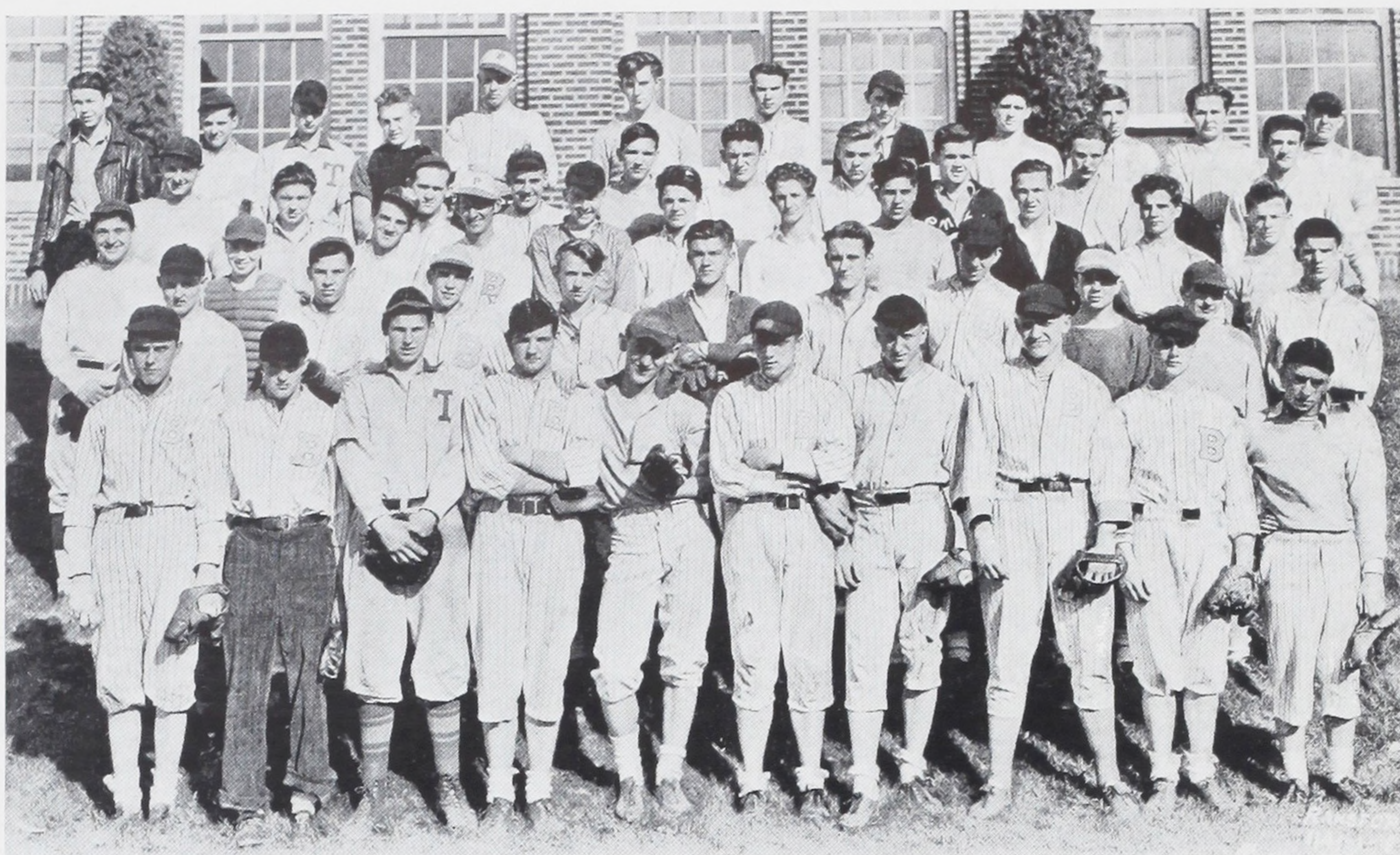
Benson's first victory came at the expense of the dying Generals from Grant high school. The game was too close for comfort. When trailing by one point in the last few seconds of play, Herman Rigutto let fly a one-handed do or die shot from the middle of the floor, which, much to the surprise of everyone, swished the hemp simultaneously with the crack of the gun, leaving the Mechanics with a 25 to 24 victory.

Following Benson's second victory over Grant, the Generals really went to town.

In the return game with Washington the Mechanics took a decisive victory from the Washingtonians by a score of 31 to 24. The closing week of league games saw Benson trimmed 51 to 32 by the Roosevelt Roughriders, and in the last regular game of the season the Mechanics pulled a surprise victory from the third place Franklin Quakers by a close 22 to 21 score.

The city basketball tournament was held at the Jefferson high school gym, March 9 to 12. All Portland teams were barred from the state tournament on account of differences in rules. On the first day of the play-off Benson took a 39 to 32 victory over the Franklin Quakers to put us in the upper bracket. However, in the semi-finals, the Jefferson quintet took the Mechanics by a score of 35 to 30. The boys came back the next night to triumph over Roosevelt by a score of 46 to 42, and took third place and a handsome trophy.

The fine showing of the team was made possible by the coaching of Fred (Lefty) Marineau who took an almost wholly inexperienced group of boys and made them into a smooth working team in a couple of months. We wish also to salute the team who could take Mr. Marineau's instruction and carry it out skillfully enough to get third place in the city standings.

The last meet held before this story's publication was a relay meet at Grant High School with the Generals again mastering the field and taking the majority of first places. However the distance medley team composed of Abbott, Groshens, Lee, and Alberty took a second place and Robert Swain drew a second place in the pole vault event in which Reed Club took first.

With such a small number of returning lettermen on the squad you can readily see why this year's track team isn't bowling them over, but you can expect big things from next year's track team because we will have quite a number of this year's junior aggregation returning to be varsity material for next year.

Hill Military Academy trotted off with the awards this year, but we would like to put in our bid for fame by saying that in three meets between the Techmen and the Academists, Benson won by scores of 14-1, 8-2, and 6-2, the last match having a divided group of Tech wrestlers since there was a necessity of having three matches going on at the same time.

In the city A.A.U. meet, held in the Benson gymnasium, sixty, six-minute bouts were held, and four out of ten titles were taken by Benson wrestlers. Below is the list of titles taken by Benson with their opponents: 98 pound class—G. Shido of Benson over R. Marshall of Manley Center by a decision. 108 pound class—J. Nomi of Benson took a fall from Okada of Benson. 118 pound class—Sono of Benson won by a fall from Reuter of Hill Military Academy. 128 pound class—H. Schlappi of Benson won a decision from D. Whitbeck of Benson.

Coming close on the heels of their city championship meet, the Tech wrestlers traveled north to take a decisive victory over Lincoln High school of Tacoma, Washington by taking seven out of nine matches. Garnering 69 points to their opponents 56, the matmen won by a final score of 21-8. While the number of matches looked in favor of Benson, it must be noted the difference in points indicated that the two teams were very evenly matched.

Planning to take the B. E. Thurber three-year-team trophy for the third consecutive time in the Northwest Tournament at Camas, the Tech wrestling squad found that the ruling made by the Oregon Athletic Association prohibited them from entering the meet and caused them to lose the trophy.

In the final meet of the current season Benson pitted eight boys against nineteen of Multnomah club in the annual Oregon A.A.U. amateur athletic championship and brought home six trophies with eight boys. The Techmen split A.A.U. honors with the winged "M", and three Benson boys were crowned tops in their respective weights. The three crowned championship Benson wrestlers and runners-up are as follows: 115 pounds—Sono of Benson over Gillen also of Benson by a decision, 123 pounds—Whitbeck of Benson over Solom of Multnomah Athletic Club by a fall in 2 minutes and 52 seconds, 134 pounds—Carlton of Benson over Nishikawa of Manley Center by a decision. So closed the 1938 season which was very successful for the Bensonites who piled up 71 wins to 13 losses.

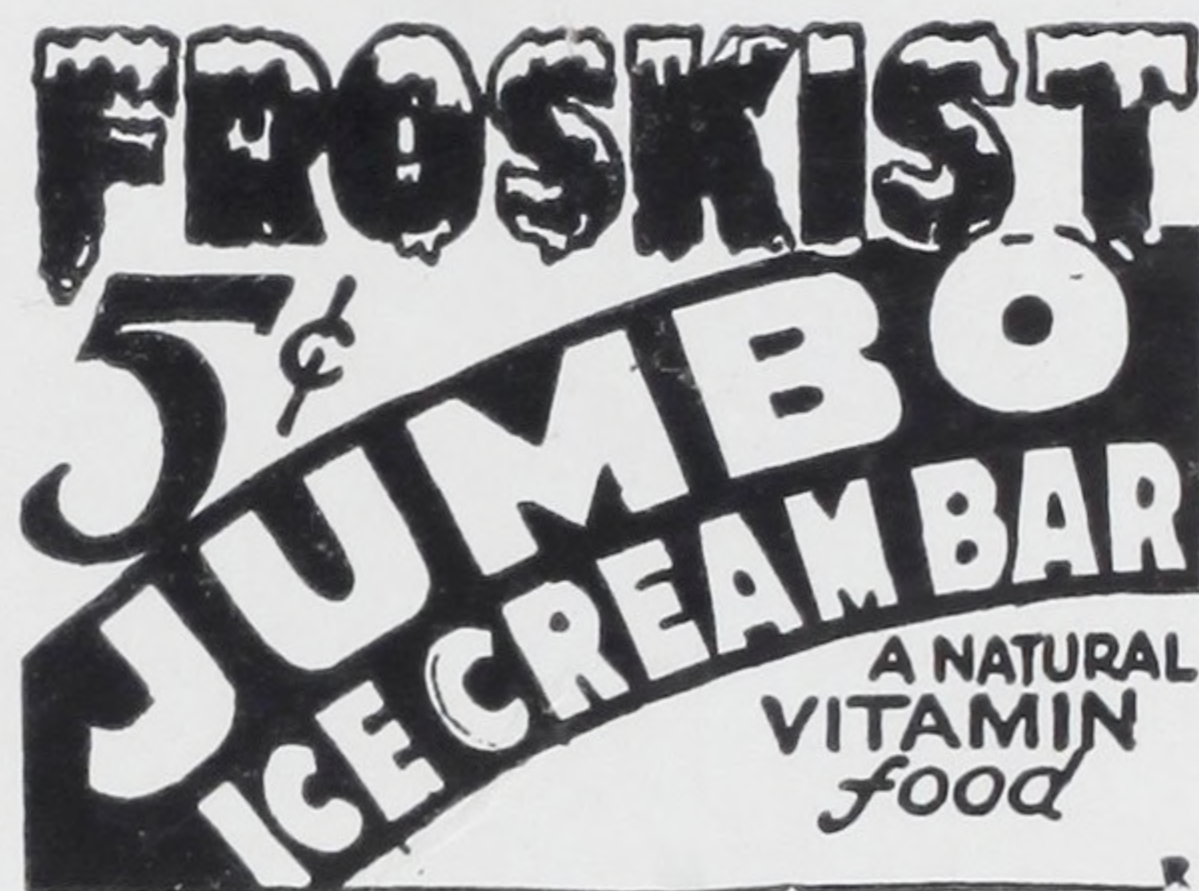
