

#### BENSON'S OFFICE STAFF



## Oregon's First Citizen

(Editor's Note: This biography of Simon Benson was written by L. R. Alderman, Superintendent of Portland Public Schools in 1916, and was published in the first issue of the Poly Tech.)

Mr. Simon Benson, for whom Benson Polytechnic School is named, was born in the year 1855, Gilbert Valley, Norway. When he was twelve years old he worked his passage to the United States, then worked his way westward, and spent several years on a farm in Wisconsin, working for his board. Then he went into the lumber camps of Wisconsin, and learned a good deal about logging and lumbering and the control of men. When he was twenty-five he came West, and went to work in a logging camp at Deer Island on the Columbia River.

It was not long until he had his own logging camp; and by his grasp of every detail and by working from five o'clock in the morning until nine at night, he soon made his camp the most successful on the river. Efficiency seemed to be the motto of the young Norwegian, and no detail was too small for him to take hold of and master. Everything must be in its place and no rope was allowed to unravel. The life was strenuous, but the main characteristic of the camp was the wholesome goodfellowship. Every man was expected to do his duty; there was no brow-beating by their modest fellow-worker, Simon Benson. Each man learned to love him and stayed or returned each season to work for his friend and companion.

He took a keen interest in the reading of his men, and, although his own education was limited, he kept up on current events. His systematic mind so arranged the facts that he became conversant on all topics.

He took trips from his logging camp at Deer Island to all parts of the country, and personally inspected timber. As his income permitted he bought this piece and that until his holdings were large. Then came the increased demand for timber. His keen judgment told him that was the time to sell. He sold for \$4,000,000.00, finding himself a wealthy man.

Going up the Columbia many times in the pursuit of his lumbering interests, Mr. Benson each time noticed the scenic magnificence of river and mountain side. It became his ambition to see a wonderful road that should make the incomparable beauty of river and gorge and waterfall accessible to all. So with tireless enthusiasm and generous donations of money he helped to make the Columbia Highway a reality.

He saw the loss incurred by using energy for pulling through muddy roads and advocated hard-surface roads for the whole country. In San Francisco at a big road meeting, he made a speech that is still quoted all over the Coast by saying: "Let us have a road from Mexico to Canada where we can run the whole way on high."

His interest in the Trade School came by observing the number of applications for menial positions who claimed they were college graduates. The thought occurred to this systematic, broad-minded man that everybody ought

not to be trained in the same way, that a man's education should have some bearing on his life's work. Though democratic to the core he saw that equal opportunity for all does not mean identical opportunity. During his whole lifetime he had always felt the need of more education, and had felt many times that he was stumbling in the work where he might have been working in the light if he had had more opportunities. He was appealed to by all sorts of schools to donate; but when he visited the Portland School of Trades and saw the practical work that was being done there, he realized that this was the real open door of opportunity for many people, for he knew the need of modern industry-trained men. Realizing all this, Mr. Benson gladly donated \$100,000.00 to the school that now bears his name.

The Benson Polytechnic School will be in its new quarters and will be ready for occupancy before another year rolls by. It will occupy a site of seven and one-half acres in the very heart of the city and will have courses that combine culture and the practical. It will train as far as it is humanly possible up to the Benson ideal.

The school is very fortunate in having for its name that of the first citizen of the state, Simon Benson.

Among the three hundred innocent freshmen who entered Benson in January, 1939, were politicians, sportsmen, camera fiends, club enthusiasts, writers, and speechmakers.

With the very able assistance of their teachers, these boys worked to win the respect of their classmates.

Four years later when the class of "Jan '43" chose the Poly Tech staff, Bert Close became Editor; a live wire, Gus Sakelaris, received the position of Assistant Editor; and three-year letterman, Melvert Byers, took on the duties of Sports Editor. A camera fiend, George Kasten, was chosen Photo Editor; Bob Daugherty as Club Editor was responsible for a list of club members and officers, and Neil Jones, Mechanical Editor, saw that the book was printed.

### CLASS HISTORY

The first meeting of the January '43 class was held in the auditorium on March 23, 1942. Mr. Bittner, Dean of Boys, presided over the meeting and introduced the advisors, Mrs. Hall and Mr. Cahill, to the class.

At the second meeting of the class the newly elected officers presided. Bert Elliot was chosen president; James Peterson, Vice-President; Constantine Sakelaris, Secretary; Bob Helzer, Treasurer; Kenneth Schedler, Sergeant-at-Arms and Bertrand Close was elected as Editor of the Poly Tech, possibly the last issue for the duration of the war.


"The Arrival of Kitty," a slapstick comedy in three acts, was presented by the class to a rollicking and enthusiastic audience on the evening of December 18.

## CLASS PLAY

Laughter filled the air on the night of December 18, 1942, as the senior class presented the slapstick comedy, "The Arrival of Kitty".

The play was centered around Bill Messenger who portrayed the part of Bob Baxter, an athletic college graduate who was in love with Jane, played by Nan Helms from Gable High School. Jane's wealthy father drew up a particular will, stating that his daughter should marry Benjamin Moore, a bachelor of forty who had saved his life once, but Jane who was in love with Bob, had ideas of her own. Winkler, Jane's uncle and guardian, played by Dick Warner, took Jane and her old aunt to the Halcin House in the Catskill Mountains, determined to force Jane into marriage. 
#### STUDENT BODY OFFICERS

0-28 Grant—Benson just couldn't hold down the Generals. A shower of completed passes, a powerful and versatile running attack was just too much for the plucky Benson boys.


18-0 Commerce—The determined Techmen plunged and passed to their first win of the season. Harrison, B. Weyer, and Hanning scored the touchdowns.


