


It is the hope of the staff that this work will long remain as a memorial of the varied experiences and lasting friendships that have been made in this school.


BENSON LIBRARY

JANUARY CLASS HISTORY

For our officers we chose: George Roth, president; George Schmidt, vicepresident; Ernest Hardt, secretary; William Wittkop, treasurer; Dick Hennessy, sergeant-at-arms; and Tom Cohen, Poly Tech editor.

We picked our class pins and chose Steffens-Colmer to take our class pictures.

At 8 o'clock on the evenings of December 3 and 4 we presented a class play jointly with the June class entitled "Room Trouble".



Mr. Harper is a graduate of Oregon State College, where he lettered in football. He is from Portland and attended Franklin High School, where he made the All-City football team.




COACH "SHARKEY" NELSON




COACH CLIFF WISE


BENSON 21—CLEVELAND 6

In the fifth round of Interscholastic League play Benson's 1948 team met its first defeat.



BENSON 0-ROOSEVELT 28



BENSON 7—LINCOLN 0



Coach Lefty Marineau had a good turnout for track this year. Benson took fourth spot in the city relays with five teams, and the pole vault going to the Hayward relays at Eugene.

Out of the five events Tech scored in four. Norman Gerg tied for second in the pole vault. The 880-yard relay team, composed of Bardsley, Burnette, Miller and Herder, came in second in the city meet and tied for second at the Hayward relays. These same fellows, composing the 440-yard relay, too, scoring a close third in the city meet, saw action in the state meet where they placed fourth. 
STATE SWIMMING CHAMPS


