




Mr. William Owens was our storeroom manager for four years and was highly respected for his efficient administration of the large amount of tools and supplies for which he was responsible.


This band is the biggest band in Benson's history and numbers 75 players in the marching group and 60 in the Concert Band.





COACH CHUCK MUCHA

Mr. Mucha, who is swimming and tennis coach, also directs one of the most active and well planned intramural programs in the city. Last year the swim team, under his guidance, won both city and state championships. This year they came in fourth in state. His tennis teams are always rated high. While at Benson, Chuck has directed a splendid intramural program in which thousands or boys have participated.

Coach Mucha won All-American football honors at Washington State.

COACH HUBERT SHOVLIN

Mr. Shovlin, junior football and basketball mentor at Benson, is a well liked figure on the school's coaching staff. Although he has been here only since last Fall, he has made himself popular by getting along famously with his charges. His junior football and basketball teams did not fare as well as they might have due to the moving up of several of his regulars to the varsity squads. "Hub" lettered two years in both track and football while at Denver University in Colorado.

COACH CLIFF WISE

Coach Wise, head baseball and assistant football coach, has finished his second year as a member of the athletic department at Benson. His baseball team of last year ended in a four-way tie for fifth place and he is fielding another spirited team this year.

Mr. Wise is a graduate of the University of Michigan, where he played both football and baseball. He was an outstanding pitcher on the "Wolverine" diamond squad. He also was assistant freshman football coach at Michigan for one year.

COACH "SHARKEY" NELSON

Mr. Loyal D. Nelson, hard working basketball coach, has completed his second year at the helm of the Orange and Blue hoop team. This year's Mechanic squad battled hard but gained no higher than a tie for the cellar. Mr. Nelson's keen interest in basketball and boys has gained him many friends at Benson.

"Sharkey" came to Benson from Washington last year. He graduated from Central Teachers College of Oklahoma. Mr. Nelson is a student of the famous Oklahoma basketball coach, Hank Iba.

COACH FRED MARINEAU

Coach "Lefty" Marineau is Benson's athletic director and head track coach. He also coaches varsity and junior cross-country. The colorful coach is now in his eighth year at Tech. Last year he resigned as head football coach in favor of his young assistant, Ralph Harper.

Mr. Marineau still heads Benson's fine track team. In his years at Benson "Lefty" has turned out many great runners and has a reputation around the Northwest for his winning track teams.

COACH RALPH HARPER

Popular young Ralph Harper succeeded "Lefty" Marineau as head coach of the Mechanic grid machine. He was assistant coach prior to taking over the head post. He also is assistant track coach. "Harps" is in his third year at Benson.

Harper graduated from Oregon State in 1946 where he played football under Lon Stiner. He is a Portland product, having played All-city football for Franklin High School in his senior year. He played guard at both OSC and Franklin.

HISTORY OF PREP SPORTS

Due to the interest taken by many of the Benson students, a summary of the championships taken by Benson and the other schools in the city has been compiled for their benefit. The sports covered are the five major sports—basketball, football, track, relays and baseball—and the minor sports—cross country, hockey, tennis, golf, bowling and swimming.

The first competition scheduled in the major sports seems to have been in the year 1906, which seems a long time ago to us. In 1906 many parochial schools were entered, including Portland Academy, West Side, Columbia University and Hill Military. The only sport in which a championship was at stake was track, which Portland Academy promptly won. The year 1907 saw the abolition of football and basketball, and it was not until two years later that baseball was inaugurated. Relays were the last major sport to get under way, this in 1921.

Since 1906, many schools have dropped out and several have taken their places. Grant joined in 1926 and Edison, or Sabin, started in 1940, only to drop out again.

In years past, the Benson basketball team has managed to cop the city title four times and take fifth place twice in the state meet. One year the Mechanics had such a hot squad of ball players that all five members of the quintet were chosen first string all-city, a feat yet to be duplicated by any team. Under the direction of many able coaches the Techmen captured the crown in the early year of 1923, when they shared honors with the Lincoln Cardinals. Benson came back in 1932 to regain the title, only to lose it again in '33. After another year of hard struggle the Techmen hoop crews regained their standing by taking the championship two years straight, 1935 and 1936.


The Tech elevens have not been as fortunate, only hitting paydirt by taking first twice in the school's history. In 1928, under the direction of Clarence Bell, the Mechanics hit the championship jackpot. Since that time, the local squads have failed to hit the top notch in prep standings except for the '40 title. In 1940, under the able guidance of "Lefty" Marineau, they regained their championship rating in a three-way tie with Grant and Jefferson.

The Benson track team has made the championship grade three times since the sport was started. In 1927 and 1928 the Mechanics held the top position for two years before being pushed out of the running by Washington in 1929. In 1946, Benson once again won the title. The Benson relay team captured the city title in 1936.

In baseball, the pill tossers placed at the head of the league for three successive years—1923, 1924 and 1925. In 1925 we shared the cup with Washington and Commerce. We also held the title in 1944. Benson has more seconds and thirds than any other school in the city.

BENSON 0-ROOSEVELT 28

September 23 and 26, 1949

BENSON 19—CLEVELAND 7


October 1, 1949

At Cleveland the Indians got away to an early seven-point lead, but the Techmen came back with power aplenty to forge their 19 to 7 victory. A 20-yard pass from McCauley to McKee in the end zone gave the Indians their touchdown with Dave Starbuck snagging a pass for the extra point. Tech power then took over with Bob Finkle scoring from the two-yard line in the first and second quarter and Duane Benfit scampering over for 6 points in the final chapter to complete the scoring.

BENSON 13—WASHINGTON 7

October 8, 1949

At Washington, after a scoreless first half, Benson power again proved the winning factor, as the Mechanics routed the Colonial eleven 13 to 7. The Techmen scored first in the third period with Bob Finkle lugging the pigskin over from the one after a sustained 65-yard drive. Benson scored again in the final canto on a 55-yard pass play from Don Pooschke to Frank Hannibal. Pooschke tossed the leather from his own 45 to Hannibal on the Washington 35, where Jimmy Miller made the key block of the Colonial safety to set Hannibal in the open for six points. The Colonials scored in the last minute of play. French Wagner gathered in a pass in the end zone flipped by Don Keller.

BENSON 0—JEFFERSON 38

October 15, 1949

At Jefferson, a fired-up Demo grid machine upset Benson 38 to 0. The Demos' Pat Curtis scored in the first quarter and two drives were finished by Dale Brethauer and Ted Meier in the second. Bob Hindel recovered a blocked Tech kick in the Benson end zone to give Jefferson a 26 to 0 halftime lead. In the third period Brethauer went 50 yards for six points and Meier made the sixth and final touchdown.

BENSON 7—LINCOLN 7

October 22, 1949

Benson and Lincoln fought to a 7-all tie at Kamm Field which came close to ending in a full-scale riot among players and supporters of each team. Benson scored first when Gerald Maurer recovered a fumble on the Cardinal twelve. Steve Bell then carried to the five and big Bob Finkle took it over. Linocln scored in the fourth period on a quarterback sneak by Rupert Anderson after having had seven chances inside the one-yard stripe.

BENSON 7—GRANT 27

October 29, 1949

Benson got away to a quiet lead when little Tommy Nowell recovered a General fumble on the Grant nine and in three tries burly Bob Finkle went over from the three for the score. Dutch Schwerdt then kicked the extra and Benson was leading the soon-to-be State Champs. This lead was short-lived, however, as the Generals scored in every period to grind out a 27 to 7 triumph.

BENSON 15—FRANKLIN 33

November 5, 1949

Benson's Techmen got away to an early 7 to 0 lead against the Quakers of Franklin when on the opening kickoff speed merchant Johnny Herder took the ball on his own three-yard line and wove his way 97 yards for a touchdown. But the Quakers' third place city team scored twice in the first period, once again in the second and twice more in the third to win handily 33 to 15. Benson's second touchdown was scored when Yancy sneaked across from the four in the final quarter and added a safety when Chuck Odor caught All-City Kaye Booth in the Quaker end zone in the final minute of the game.

SUMMARY—BASKETBALL 1949-50 By BOB HYLAND

In the 1949-50 Prep Basketball Circuit the Mechanic casaba crew won only three of their fourteen games and dropped five of their eight pre-season tilts. Benson lost the opening league contest to the defending state titlist, Roosevelt, after outplaying the Teddies three quarters of the fray. In the first half of play the Tech quintet won two straight by defeating Franklin and Washington, but from this point on the Mechanics went winless until the final game of the season. In this game the ball controlling Techmen edged Jefferson and knocked them out of a first place tie with Roosevelt. This defeat of the Donkeymen has gone down in the record books as the biggest upset in Portland prep basketball history. Frank Hannibal was Tech's high scorer for the season with 148 points. Jack Strickler and Sam Meyers graduated at mid-year and Hannibal, Grey and Johnson graduate in June. McLain will graduate after three games next year, leaving Coach Nelson with Strader, Drennan, Bell, Smith, Bardsley, Greiner and those up from the Junior team to build his next season's hoop squad.



VARSITY BASEBALL

Benson's baseball team has just gotten started in league play as this book goes to press. Therefore we cannot bring you a complete report of the 1950 baseball season. The Techmen beat Washington in two of their three practice games, with Tech's Bernie Pitts pitching a one-hitter in the final game. Coach Cliff Wise presented a young team in the initial league contest which belied its inexperience by pounding out a lopsided 9 to 2 verdict over Lincoln. The Techmen battered four Cardinal hurlers for seven hits, including a "grand slam" home run by catcher Duane Greene, and committed only one error in the field. Don Smith, winning Mechanic hurler, was stingy after a shaky first inning in which Lincoln scored twice, and allowed only two hits.

In the second game of the season Benson lost to Jefferson by a 7 to 2 count. The Demos held a 4 to 2 margin at the start of the fifth and then took advantage of Mechanic generosity to score three times without the benefit of a hit.



VARSITY TRACK

Coach Lefty Marineau has a lot of rebuilding to do on this year's track squad as many of his regulars that were to be back failed to return. Last season's 440 and 880 relay team only regained one regular, Ken Bardsley. Of the other three members, Roy Burnett joined the Air Force, John Herder was ineligible because of age, and Jim Miller injured his leg in football. Burnett was the city broad jump champion last year, Miller ran the 440, and Herder anchored both teams and ran the low hurdles.

Two of Benson's finest distance runners, Ed Bell and Bill Linesay, failed to return to the cinderpaths because of injuries and Norman Gerg, ace pole vaulter, joined the Marines.

In the city relays this year Grant won the meet with 37 points, followed by Franklin with 29, Lincoln with 28, Jefferson with 27, Benson and Roosevelt 26, Washington 6, and Cleveland 0.

Benson's thinclads won the broad jump and set a new record of 77 feet, bettering the old record of 76 feet 2 inches by ten inches. Composing the record breaking team were Ken Bardsley, Pat Trotti, Fred Parker and Wayne Sanders. Kubli of Benson tied for first in the pole vault, while other Mechanics pulled down second places in the shuttle hurdles and medley relay.







INTRAMURAL SPORTS

Intramural sports, headed by versatile Chuck Mucha, have contributed considerably to the recreation and enjoyment of Benson's average student. This program makes it possible for the boys to develop sportsmanship along with many other numerous benefits. Several of Benson's outstanding athletes were discovered through the intramural program. Coach Mucha's outstanding supervision and direction of the many sports has brought Benson the recognition of having the best intramural set-up in the city and state.

A total of twelve teams with one hundred and nineteen students participated in the annual basketball tournament.
