
MR. OWEN HAYS

On March 23, 1954, Radio Station KBPS, the Voice of the Portland Public Schools, celebrated its 31st birthday. Its call letter, KBPS, show that the station is located in Benson. Those who know the story of its 31 years of educational broadcasting know that it was purchased by the Benson Student Body and operated by Benson faculty members until 1939, when the School District assumed its support and employed a station manager. Miss Patricia L. Green is the third manager of KBPS and in addition supervises radio in all of Portland schools. The station now also employs a Program Coordinator in charge of high school and adult program production.

KBPS is unique in that it is the only high school student-operated, school-district-owned, standard wave length broadcast station in existence. KBPS is the second oldest radio station in Portland. Original call letters were KFIF. At the time of its purchase, all stations in Portland operated on a wave length of 360 meters. Each station would take an allotment of time, be on the air for 13 minutes and then shut down for 2 minutes to listen for distress signals from ships at sea. Stations in those days had many changes in wave lengths and time on-the-air. KBPS has shared its spot on the dial with almost every station in Portland. It stopped sharing its wave length with station KXL in 1941 and went to 1450 on the dial, where it is now. Of the three men who pioneered the building and plans for KBPS only Mr. R. T. Stephens is still at Benson as a Physics instructor. Mr. Stephens now handles all legal matters for KBPS which concern the Federal Communications Commission.

Benson students learn the varied techniques of radio work through producing, announcing, sportscasting, and through the setting up and recording of all types of programs in their daily operation of a real broadcast station. Students become efficient combo-men from operating the KBPS control board, and many have earned their first class broadcast "ticket" which enabled them to join the staffs of commercial radio stations. Stations throughout the Northwest have former Benson, KBPS students on their staff.

Darrell Erickson, editor, picked up the ball after Mr. Hysmith left, and did a tremendous amount of work, assisted by his companion, Bill Hill.


The editorial and layout work was handled almost entirely by Hill and Erickson. Harold Dubrau, Wayne Morris and King Quan also were a big help in editorial work.


The principles of National Honor Society are: Character, leadership, scholarship, and service—and through its activities the society attempts to recognize the qualities.




RALPH HARPER

This year's football team proved themselves to be the greatest in the history of Benson High. They took undisputed possession of first place for the first time since 1928 by winning all seven of their league games. In winning the P.I.L. title, the Techmen set two school records. The Mechanics piled up 135 points to break the old record of 116 made by the Bensonites of 1932. This year's squad also had the stingiest defense, allowing only 15 points for their opponents. The previous low was 20 points held by Mr. Marineau's team of 1940.

With players like Jimmie Williams, George Sheasly, Jerry Clark, Gordy Grenier, Reid Lindsley, Jim Davis, and many others, it's no wonder the Mechanics wound up in the first slot. The team well deserved the honor.

KELSO 13 . . BENSON 6

In a pre-season game at Kelso, Washington, The Techmen were handed a 13-6 setback by the Highlanders to officially open the football season.

The first quarter saw two evenly matched teams in a scoreless first period. Early in the second quarter Benson recovered a fumble on the Highlander 19. "Tank" Davis hit right tackle for 10 yards and a first down. From here Williams took a pitchout to the three, where Simpson went the final three yards on a quarterback sneak. Don Krivanek missed the kick. With two minutes remaining in the first half, Stan Hicks picked up a wild ball and carried it to the Tech 18. On the next play, an end run by Bill Lehning tied the score. The kick was no good. The Highlanders scored again on an 18 yard run through tackle by Dennis Gregory. This time the kick was good. Benson's attempt to get back into the ball game was futile as they lost the ball on downs to end the ball game.

BENSON 14 . . GRANT 0

Benson's opening game of the 1953 prep football season saw the Mechanics defeat the Generals from Grant 14-0. This was the first time a Benson team accomplished this since 1940.

The Techmen started their scoring in the Jamboree first quarter at Multnomah Stadium. With only 40 seconds gone in the first period, Jimmy Williams took a pitchout on the Tech 18 and ran around right end for an 82 yard T.D. run. Krivanek's kick was good and the Mechanics led 7-0 with less than a minute gone in the game. With only a minute left in the quarter, Grant had pushed all the way to the Tech 10 where Williams intercepted a pass on the two and ran it back to the Tech 18. The quarter ended with Benson leading 7-0.

The game was finished the following night on the General turf. The second and third periods were scoreless as the Techmen were busy stopping Grant drives in both quarters. With three minutes left in the fourth and final period, Williams took a pitch out around end for 37 yards to the General 13. After a 15 yard penalty had brought the ball back to the 28, Jim Simpson threw a pass to Grenier in the end zone for the final Tech counter. Again, Krivanek's kick was good and Benson won 14-0.

BENSON 21 . . FRANKLIN 6

After a 14-0 win over Grant, the fired-up Mechanics proceeded to humble the Franklin Quakers by a 21-6 count on the Quaker turf. Techman Jim Davis scored the first Tech T.D. on a three yard buck early in the second period to climax a Benson 56 yard push. Three minutes before the half, Jimmy Simpson threw a pitchout to Precious who humped six yards through a hole at right guard to score Benson's second T.D. Franklin's Doyle Chapman then scored the Quaker's lone touchdown on a 72 yard jaunt around the left side of the Tech line. In the third period, Williams scored over right guard from two yards out to wind up a 66 yard drive. Don Toevanek booted all three extra points to boost Benson's game total to 21 points and to give them their second straight win.

Benson's next game was with Washington. The Colonials had been defeated twice before the Mechanics had their chance. Williams scored the second 6 through right end on a 26 yard run after he and Willie led a march to the Colonial 26. The third Tech touchdown came when "Smek" Simpson quietly stole down the field for 27 yards on a quarterback sneak to the Washington 2. From there Precious went over for the touchdown. Jim Davis added two more points when he humped over their forward wall and nailed Ken Aberle for the safety. Thusly Benson whopped Washington 21-0, and gained their third straight win.




A Jefferson tackler changes Willie Smith's mind about any ideas he had of going all the way. Obviously, the weather was rather foul.

Benson's fourth consecutive win was over the favored Democrats from Jefferson. The Mechanics out-mudded the Demos 7-0 on their own field. The Jeffersonians were determined to win this game in order to keep their first place spot, but the Mechanics were more determined to take over first place themselves, so they did.

Tech started the only touchdown ramble of the game on their own 9. The combined efforts of Jim Davis and Jim Simpson put the ball on the 19. Then the Tech forward wall, led by George Sheasley, opened a five foot hole through which Jimmie Williams ran 81 yards for the touchdown. The extra point was scored by "Precious" when he shot through right guard. Thusly Tech beat Jeff 7-0 to climb undisputed into first place with three games left in league play.




Jimmie Williams zigged when he should have zagged on this play as he is about to be mashed by five Roughriders.

Benson made it five down and two to go by tromping the Teddies 28-0 on the Roosevelt field. Had the Teddies won this game there would have been a first place tie between Benson, Jefferson, and Roosevelt. The Techmen, however, couldn't see this so they beat Roosevelt to remain in first place all by themselves.

Jimmy Williams scored twice in this game. After Jim Simpson scored the first Tech T.D. on a 30 yard run in the first quarter, Williams made his two. Jim Davis recovered a Roosevelt fumble on their own 39. Williams then hit the guard slot and went for six. In the third quarter two Simpson-to-Grenier passes moved the ball to the Teddie 25. Precious took a pitchout from Simpson and buzzed around end for the third Benson T.D. Gordy Grenier surprised everyone by taking a handoff from Simpson and slipping around left end for six. Don Krivanek and his educated toe booted all four extra points.





BENSON 13 . . . CLEVELAND 9

Benson's sixth win was undoubtedly their toughest victory of the season. The Mechanics edged the Indians from Cleveland 13-9 and they had to come from behind to do it. The triumph, however, kept Benson on top of the league with six wins and no defeats.

The first half was completely dominated by the Indians. Dick Stratford scored Cleveland's only T.D. with only two and a half minutes left in the first half to end a 69 yard Indian drive. The kick was good and the Tribe led at half-time, 7-0.

In the third period the Techmen were still buffaloed. Jimmy Williams was hit in the end zone for a safety that put the Indians ahead 9-0. With seven minutes remaining in the last quarter, Al Sovereign was forced to punt. Cleveland's Jim Richardson dropped the ball and George Sheasly recovered it on the Tribe 18. Three plays later, Williams skirted right end and scored. Krivanek missed the kick leaving the score 9-6, cleveland. Three minutes later, Sovereign punted again. This time Sheasly downed the ball on the Tribe four, and the Tech line went to work, which Reid Lindsley promptly gobbled up for the final Tech T.D. Krivanek's kick was good and Benson left the field victorious 13-9.





BENSON 31 . . LINCOLN 0

Benson captured their first clean-cut city championship title since 1928 by virtue of the 31-0 blasting the Techmen gave the Cards. The final standings of the 1953 race saw Benson on top with seven wins and no defeats. Precious was Tech's offensive star as he scored 25 of the 31 Benson points.

Tech opened the scoring when Williams cracked right guard from five yards out in the first quarter. In the second period, on a reverse, Williams took the ball from Smith and went 22 yards for Tech T.D. number two. A few mniute later, Sheasley took a hand-off from Grenier on the Cardinal three and scored the third Benson touchdown. The half ended with Benson leading 18-0.

On the opening kickoff after the half, Williams got the ball on the ten and scampered all the way for six. Eight minutes later, after a Benson drive, Precious scored his last T.D. of the night on a 22 yard run around right end. Jimmy also ran over the extra point to end the Benson scoring parade.

SALEM 31 . . BENSON 6



The Tech defense was no match for Salem backs like Terry Salisbury and Herb Tripplett, who were responsible for all four Vik T.D.'s. Salisbury scored twice, Triplett scored once, and a Triplette pass to Burkland accounted for another. The Viks collected another seven points on two safeties and Ray Taylor's thre P.A.T.'s.

Thus, the Benson gridmen officially wound up their '53-'54 football season with a record of seven wins and two losses.



In the past two years, the Mechanics have turned out two of the best basketball teams the school has seen in many years. Both teams wound up in a tie for second place, but this year's team won the playoff game and went to the state tourney for the first time since 1936. At the end of the first half of the season, it looked as though the Techmen weren't going to make it as easy as they had a three win four loss record. They caught fire during the second half and beat everybody including Roosevelt, the city champs. Benson wound up the season with 16 wins and 9 losses. This doesn't sound like much, but is, considering the P.I.L. is one of the toughest leagues in Oregon.

As for the All-City team, the Techmen landed Johnny James in a forward spot on the mythical club. James was out for the first part of the season with pneumonia and without his return, the Techmen wouldn't have climbed the victory trail to second place. James played only nine games, but he piled up 144 points for a 16.0 game average. John also was named as a member of the All-State team.

BENSON 44... WASHINGTON 37

In their first PIL encounter, the Mechanics took one from the Colonials of Washington by a 44-37 count on the Col maple. The Colonia's were on the short end of the score for the duration of the game. The reason for the low score was probably due to the fact that both clubs were still a bit green on offense and the surprisingly low number of fouls.



Benson absorbed their third loss in a row to the Tribe from Cleveland by a score of 61-49 on the Tech court. The loss dropped the Mechanics to a last place tie with Washington. After a slow start, Benson led at the half way mark 22-18. Cleveland cut loose with 18 to take the lead at the end of the third period, 37-30, and held the margin for the rest of the tilt. George Bailey and Al Taylor each dropped in 13 points for Tech high point honors.

BENSON 79 ... FRANKLIN 64

After taking three games on the chin, the Tech five broke loose and slipped into a fourth place tie with Jeff by swamping the Quakers 79-64 on the Benson maple. In winning the game, the Mechanics tied the all-time PIL record for four highest team total set by Jeff in 1951. From start to finish the Techmen held the lead all the way. Gordy Grenier was high for Benson with 21, most of which were made in the first half.

The G-Men bounced into an early 13-11 first quarter lead. Early in the second period Mr. Gray put James in the game. That was all for Grant. The Mechanics were on top at half time 27-25, and led the remainder of the tilt. Johnny topped the Techmen in individual scoring as he hummed in 16 points.

LINCOLN 53...BENSON 44

The Mechanics wound up the first half with a three win, four loss record. The Lincoln Cards plastered the Techmen by a 53-44 count on the Cardinal floor. The loss left the Tech five in a fourth place tie with Jefferson. The Cards promptly took the lead and held it for the whole game. High point honors for Benson went to Jim Davis with 12.

In the last period with two minutes on the clock, Washington cut down an 11 point Tech advantage before Benson could wind it up with a two point margin. George Bailey and John James were high for Tech with 22 and 18 points respectively.

BENSON 60 . . JEFFERSON 49

Benson strengthened their hold on fourth place by dumping Jefferson 60-49 on the Tech floor and collected their fifth win against four setbacks. The Orangemen ripped into an early 17-7 first period lead and held the margin the whole game. Jeff's biggest threat came in the second period when they pulled within four points of the Mechanics. Tech's John James popped in 22 and Jim Davis dunked 15 for Benson high honors.








Johnny James moves to the center of the key, jumps out of the reach of a Jeff defender, and drops it in.


State Tourney

Bill Hill paced Tech batters with three for three in the second tilt which they lost to Franklin 12-11.


The third game saw the Grant Generals swamp Tech by the fantastic score of 26-0. The Mechancis gave Grant an added boost by committing 10 errors.


