
Principal

Dr. Leon Minear





After 381/2 years of service to the Portland school sys-

tem Roy Stevens retired.

Three years after starting at Benson, Stevens helped build KFIF radio station. Later the station's call letters were changed to KBPS when the school system took over the station for broadcasting educational programs to students in other schools. He was also the advisor for the radio club and was the originator of the slide rule classes at Benson.

He is also well remembered by ex-Bensonites who took physics courses under him. In connection with this he helped build the electric distribution panel in his old room to facilitate better physics courses which would enable students to engage in more exacting projects.

Stevens attended Ranier, Oregon, High School and the U. of O. where he received his physics degree.

Retiring Teachers

Mrs. Sylvia Kylen came to Benson Polytechnic School in 1937 after teaching at Grant High. Mrs. Kylen started out at Benson by teaching math, and after she completed an M. A. degree in Economics, she switched to social studies. Mrs. Kylen is retiring in her 16th year as a counsellor, the fourth as Head Counsellor. At the end of the school year she will be looking forward to living near the water at Seaview, Washington, with her husband. After a brief rest there, they both plan to travel.

Mrs. Kylen has always been well liked by both the administration and the students, and she, in turn, has been impressed by the steadily increasing caliber of the Benson students. She feels that the boys are more serious minded both their studies and their future work now than they were a few years ago.

Laney has been teaching mechanical drawing at Benson since September of 1921. He has always taught in room 28 except for two years during the war when he was Director of Extended Day Care, and four years when he was in room Y.


Laney has been President of the Teacher's Association, faculty advisor for the Camera Club, and he used to be in charge of the candy machines in the building.

Many changes have taken place since Laney first came to Benson. Most important of the changes were the addition of the present auditorium, gymnasium and cafeteria. The old auditorium and cafeteria occupied the present print shop area.

Mr. Laney has always taught Mechanical Drawing, but in recent years he has also taught advanced drawing which included sheet metal, machine and aircraft drafting. He also has handled EE classes for four years.

His first day was filled with excitement when he got mixed up in his directions and locked himself out of the school quite early in the morning. He said he ran across the front yard and unlocked the front doors to re-enter the school.

He saw the auditorium being constructed, the addition to the store room, Automotive wing built, and the science wing constructed. He wished he could see the completion of the North Wing, but doubts it very much.

Mr. Tague commented that the boys have improved through the years. "They are better acting and more respectful than some of the boys in the past." The halls used to look like the garbage cans had been dumped and smeared all around the halls, but now, with the student screening, students entering Benson are of the highest caliber, and have more respect for our school.

"I am still in good shape," commented Tague, "I have only missed two days in 32 years, but rule and regulations are such that I must retire. I'll be like the old fire horse, when I hear the school bells ring, I'll be rady and rarin' to go."




BENSON FIELD TRIPS


Gary was a member of the Headers of Portland, a hot rod club formed in Portland to promote safety on the road. Gary was noted for having a safe and wellkept car.


One of the most popular students at Benson this year has been Per Furst. Per is Benson's foreign exchange student from Norway. He has been living with the Marshall Malden Family.



Varsity Squad

Coach Phiester, in his first season at Benson, was greeted by many young and enthusiastic ball players, but the squad was a little shy of experience. As a consequence, Tech fielded a young "11" that should prove themselves next year. With the loss of only 4 seniors from the starting team, outlook for next year is exceptionally bright. The big hi-light of the season was an opening victory against the Wilson Trojans, 14-7. The team was plagued with about 5 close defeats. With any breaks, the final standings could have been decidedly different. The Blueprint staff wishes next year's team the best of luck.



The Benson Engineers launched the 1958 grid campaign successfully, as they tripped the Wilson Trojans 14 - 7 on the losers field. The young, spirited Techmen unleashed a solid ground game against the beefy Trojans, but did not capitalize on it until the fourth quarter. At this point, trailing by 7 points, the Engineers traveled 52 yards to pay dirt, with Allen Brooks sneaking across from the one. On the PAT, Dwight Lyons fired a pass to Jim Wilson to tie the game up. Seconds later the Techmen capitalized on a poor pass from the Wilson center, and ended up with the ball on the Trojan 25-yard line. In six plays the Engineers pushed out in front, as Jim Wilson crashed into the end zone from five yards out. Lyons again hit on the PAT, as Sam Johnson hauled in his aerial. The Trojan eleven couldn't quite muster up enough drive to counteract, so it went in scorebook 14-7.





The Lincoln Cardinals combined a solid ground game with effective passing to humble the young Techmen 20 - 0. The Cardinals scored early in the first quarter on a 66 yard march. This 6 - 0 score lasted until the fourth quarter when the Cards found the Tech defense weakening and added two more touchdowns. The Engineers could not get their offense rolling on the muddy Lincoln field, therefore receipted their fourth loss against one victory and one tie.

The Cleveland Indians, behind the hard running of Norm Patera, literally stomped the Techmen, 32 - 6 at Jefferson. Patera accounted for 19 Tribe points, more than enough to whip the stumbling Engineers. Benson opened the scoring in the first quarter as Sam Johnson capped a 66 yard drive on a 13 yard jaunt. This was the only highlight for the Techmen, as their defense crumbled and offense bogged down.

The state champs from Jefferson showed a dazzling display of football talent in humbling the Techmen 54-0. The Techmen helped the Demo cause through an acute attack of fumble-itis. Consequently, any sustained drive by the Engineers was halted abruptly. While not scoring, the Techmen managed to garner 145 net yards and seven first downs. Rudy Cunningham was the only spark for the Techmen, as he averaged 5 yards per carry on seven carries.

The Benson Engineers closed out the '58 grid campaign by being edged 20-13 at the hands of Rossevelt. In contrast to the last few games, this encounter was close all the way. The Teddies held an insecure half-time lead of just 13-7, but picked up that needed third touchdown just before the Techmen scored on a 10 yard pass to Dave Payne. On conclusion of the season, the young Engineers gained valuable experience for next year.





The Engineers lacked five seconds from gaining their second win of the season. After battling to a sorceless half, the Techmen broke the ice in the third quarter as Jim Wilson scored on a double reverse. A Lyons to Maxwell pass for the PAT made it 7-0. This lead was held all the way until, with five seconds to go, Washington pushed across the equalizer. So, the luckless Techmen had to settle for a tie at 7-7. Hi-lights for the Engineers were fleet Jim Wilson's punt returns. Three times he returned punts over 40 yards. Allan Brooks also ate up good yardage with quarter keeper plays.

Victory again was taken from the Techmen in the last few seconds. With 8 seconds to go in the game, the Generals pushed into the end zone to erase a 14-13 Tech lead. The Generals drew first blood, as they marched the opening kickoff back in four plays. Tech squared matters on a five yard pass to sophmore end Dave Payne. Grant retaliated in the second quarter, to hold a slim 13-7 lead at half time. Benson went ahead in the third quarter on a 3 yard plunge by Rudy Cunningham and the PAT pass to Jim Wilson, only to have the Generals steal victory from the Techmen.


The Franklin Quakers errupted for 2 touchdowns in the last 43 seconds of play, to come from behind and hand the Engineers their third defeat. It also marked the third time in which victory has been stolen from Tech in the last few seconds. The final scored of the game was 26-20, somewhat of a reversal of a 20-6 Tech lead with 8 minutes to go in the game. Rudy Cunningham engineered two of Tech's touchdowns on runs of 7 and 1 yards. Jim Wilson scored the other TD on a 28 yard pass from Sam Johnson. Wilson had a 75 yard run called back because of a penalty, which could have made the difference in the ball game.

The surprising Madison Senator's kept their record clean to the expense of the Engineers. What was somewhat of a defensive game in the begining, the light Madison "11" pushed across for 7 right before halftime. They added 7 more in the third quarter, and hold this advanged until about 4 minutes to go in the 4th quarter. At this point, Jim Wilson took a pitchout and rifled a 25 yard pass to Sam Johnson in the end zone. Rudy Cunningham scored Benson's 6th consecutive PAT for the season. Cunningham was fairly busy for the Techmen, as he gained almost half of Tech's rushing yard-132 age. Madison displayed a gritty defense, as they engineered two successful goal line stands to keep Tech from an upset.









SENIOR PLAYERS






BENSON VS. ROOSEVELT

BENSON VS. GRANT



BENSON VS. JEFFERSON






BENSON VS. WASHINGTON




VARSITY SWIMMING


