Benson Site Council Team

What is the role of the Benson Site Council Team? The Site Council team plays an important role in decision-making at Benson Tech. The Site Council is a group of teachers, parents, classified employees, alumni and students that work with the principal and his/her administration to develop, review and evaluate school improvement programs, safety protocols, parent engagement opportunities and discuss the overall goals of the school for the current school year and beyond. The Site Council also looks at how to best serve the whole school and how to best move policy and guidelines along that affect the school holistically in collaboration with the school principal. Benson's enrollment to be scaled back?!

Below are comments from PPS School Board Member Paul Anthony, which he shared with a number of Benson Tech supporters (and allowed us to share with all alumni). Benson has been operating under an artificial enrollment cap for nearly a decade or more. Many people have been working tirelessly over that time help the district see their error and increase or remove this cap. Last year, PPS finally committed to increasing Benson's freshman enrollment to 365 students, but as you'll read below, that commitment is beginning to waver.

"Thank you for all your ongoing support for Benson Tech and Portland Public Schools' students. PPS staff is asking the Superintendent to go back on the Board's previous commitment to increase Benson Tech's next incoming class to 365; instead, they want it scaled back to 300. I believe the reasons they cite are spurious:

We have an exciting time in June planned for three days of events to celebrate the Centennial of Benson Tech, Be sure to put June 9-11 on your calendars. Benson Tech House construction almost complete

The current house project for Benson Tech students is located at 130 NE Skidmore, just two blocks east of MLK Blvd. It is nearly complete, lacking only countertops, appliances, upstairs carpet, and final cleaning before sale.

Due to the enrollment cap and changes in the schedule it has taken a little over four years to complete this house, but it should sell for a lot more than anything Benson students have completed before. Students framed, roofed, installed windows and siding, did an immense amount of CVG fir interior trim work, built and installed cabinets, and much more to complete this house. We are quite proud of what they have accomplished, and will have an open house at the



house around spring break to celebrate completion.

Our next house project will be on N Haight Ave, just south of the Humboldt Elementary site. We have encountered some permitting hurdles to unlink this and the two adjacent future home sites from the Conditional Use Permit of the school, so construction on the next home will not begin until next fall.

We currently have 12 seniors and 18 juniors in the Building Construction major, and 90 total Sophomores in the Construction rotation this year. In addition to building endgrain cutting boards for the Tech Show, students this year are working through a curriculum in partnership with PNCI where they can earn pre-apprenticeship certifications as well as credits at PCC.

Wellness Center caps off first year with award

After years of planning, the Benson Wellness Center opened its doors a year ago with a mission to keep students physically, mentally, and emotionally healthy. Since then, we have been able to provide Benson Tech students with one-stop shopping for their healthcare needs. We are proud to announce that we recently won a "Partnership Award" from the Oregon School Based Health Centers Program Office!

Students can access primary care; mental health services; nursing and social work services throughout

the school day. Primary Care is provided by OHSU Family Medicine at Richmond Clinic. Mental health services are provided by the Multnomah County School-Based Mental Health Program. Multnomah County Education Service District provides our school nurse, and PPS provides the Social Work services. Together we provide truly integrated care for our students in a way that minimizes disruption to the school day.

The Wellness Center also sponsors a Stress Management Class and is getting ready to launch a series of Wellness Talks, which will be lunchtime seminars on a variety of adolescent healthcare topics. Students can receive extra credit for participating in both. We are also putting together a Youth Action Council, which will serve as a kind of student board of directors for the clinic.

Update from the Counseling Department

By Amy Henry, counselor Despite the snow days, the Benson Tech counseling department has been busy in several areas:

College and Career: Dr. Sheree Thomas-Coleman joined our counseling staff as the College/AVID counselor and has already organized more than 25 college visits to our campus; scheduled campus visits for our AVID classrooms; and has held over 20 workshops for seniors around scholarships, FAFSA/ ORSAA, private school admission, etc.

All counselors were busy this fall meeting with seniors individually and holding workshops since the date for FAFSA moved from January 1 to Oct. 1. Our goal is to meet with every senior who is eligible for the Oregon Promise and make sure they fill out their FAFSA/ORSAA and the Oregon Promise (a state grant program that covers some or all of the tuition at an Oregon community college) form to take advantage of this great program.

Classroom Guidance: The counselors met with all freshmen to help them with reading their transcripts, making the most of their high school years and to start planning for after high school. We have also been working with freshman in the new required freshman College and Career class. Our topic has been setting career goals, and taking classes and participating in extracurricular activities to support these career goals. Beginning in March, we will be working with all underclassmen to select classes for the 2017-18 school year. We had a change for non-health sciences sophomores: instead of four quarter rotations in a tech area, they now take two tech classes per semester. We are hoping this change will better assist sophomores in choosing a major for their junior year. Three years ago, the State of Oregon adopted the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). In the 2017-18 school year, we will start rolling out these new standards by offering a new science class for freshman and our current science classes in a different rotation.

Student Support: Starting second semester, we are offering a mentoring/support group for African-American males through the Blueprint Foundation. We are also working with Latino Network to talk about expanding its program at Benson to include freshman and sophomores.

Training/Staff Development: Our counseling staff has been participating in several district trainings, such as Restorative Justice, Rapid Cycle of Inquiry, Check In and Check Out and Kognito, with the focus on relationship building with students. We are working with our teachers and other staff to develop a plan for professional development in this area for the next school year.


Modernizing Benson Tech for the next 100 years of scholastic excellence

Benson Tech's Centennial Anniversary year gives alumni certain cause to celebrate our alma mater's high-standard keystone traditions. The school most notably remains a state, regional and national leader in public STEAM/CTE secondary education and a prideful source of Portland-area history, culture, good works, and economic vigor. In this same year, we too may celebrate the emerging future of Benson Tech as a revitalized center for instilling university/ college and workforce readiness in students about to encounter the dynamic hyper-competitive tech-centered world.

Portland Public Schools (PPS) officials are now engaging teams of contracted architects and consultants, school administrators and staffs, and volunteer community stakeholders to ballot and pass a City of Portland May 2017 off-cycle election bond measure. The favorably polling bond, if approved by voters, will finance district school building improvements worth \$745 –\$790 million. As part of this effort, Benson Tech is scheduled to undergo essential comprehensive infrastructural and curricular modernization capable of advancing the school's scholastic excellence for the possible next 100 years.

Preliminary focus option diligence by the PPS Office of School Modernization, Bassetti Architects and Benson Tech's Master Planning Committee/Predesign Advisory Group supports a three-year phased remodeling plan costing \$202 million, with \$122 million dedicated to renovation and rebuilding expenditures that increase the school's exist-

ing total assignable square footage of 278K by approximately 132%. Final recommended remodeling cost and square-foot estimates may vary from these and other PPS-disclosed values. But Benson Tech academic/CTE-use areas will gain the greatest proposed expansion of the school's area programs.

Among bond-slated high schools, Benson Tech presents significant master-plan implementation challenges due to its constrained urban campus, high structural remediation priority and National Registry of Historic Places eligibility. Current master plan iterations emphasize progressive vertical architectural designs that respect the school's oldest historic exterior and interior spaces/surfaces, while optimizing educational functionality and climate for a capacity enrollment of 1,700 students. Landmark-protected west and north locations of campus, including the 1916 Main Classroom "A Wing," the 1927 Old Gymnasium, the 1930 Auditorium, and the 1916 Shop "C Wing" and Foundry Building, will be fully or partially restored. In contrast, light refurbishing of the much newer 1992 KBPS Radio

Station, 1991 Library/Digital Media Center, and 1964 New Gymnasium will limit hard costs as well as budget escalation, on-site logistical and safety demands, and learning disruption incurred from construction phasing. Benson Tech moreover needs substantial improvements to comply with 10 major health and safety categories. Some of the most urgent compliance concerns involve necessary seismic upgrades to school-wide unreinforced masonry, new fixture/system installations for superior drinking water and air quality, roof replacement, addition of ADA universal access, and integration of efficient electrical fixtures/systems and natural daylight in school rooms and corridors.

Proposed project specifications also aim to enrich student experiences and enhance scholastic performance with modern adaptive classrooms, extended-learning areas, and makerspaces that maintain innovative next-generation instruction/learning styles for academic and major programs, These new and medium-to-heavy remodeled envelopes and spaces, largely situated near the campus' east and south boundaries, will employ flexibility,

proximity, and transparency to form educational clusters known to encourage rigor, relevance, creativity, enthusiasm, and collaboration in academic/CTE project-based learning. Minimal construction-budget provisions for new technologies will help ensure modernization is sustained through acquisition of industry-standard and state-of-art resources. Such acquisitions, in addition to other public/private capital and service agreements, will complement present school-inventoried technologies and forward-thinking training/ entrepreneurial programs, so that future students may secure unmatched advantages for entry, retention, and advancement in higher education and/or employment choices.

Remodeling plans for core academic and CTE spaces are accen-

tuated by a proposed new multipurpose Student Commons area intended to integrate Benson Tech student and community activities. As a center of student life, the Commons will connect informal study, personal recreation, cafeteria dining and refreshments, and school-sponsored services and extramural events via improved access to the nearby West entry lawn, relaunched fine and performing arts facilities, gymnasia and Buckman field, wrap-around service providers, educational support, and a reconfigured central social courtyard with modest freight delivery and removal easement. Planned upper-floor terrace seating, walks, and viewing will facilitate Commons enjoyment and will permit pedestrian traffic to roof-top green spaces, outdoor science laboratories, and additional school sites.

Through your action, the Benson Tech community can safeguard the school's legacy from aging facilities and rapidly shifting educational and industry needs. We, together, will thereby protect Portland's history and culture as well as drive the market competitiveness of Portland-area families and businesses toward a more vibrant future.

1) We already know that the increased students can be accommodated by moving the District's PISA program to two or three comprehensive high schools (where the students in the PISA program would be much better served);

- 2) DBRAC (the District-wide Boundary Review Advisory Committee) is not going to be considering Benson Tech or, indeed, any high schools in the coming year; and
- 3) Any move to reduce Benson Tech's enrollment for construction is totally premature not only has the bond not yet passed, but the Office of School Modernization still has no idea how many (or how few) students can be accommodated onsite during construction.

Given the District's current timeline, construction on Benson Tech would not start until the incoming freshman class will have already gradu-

ated – plenty of time to make alternative arrangements before then. I am afraid that we are again looking at an attempt to punish Benson Tech for being "too successful." This last year Benson Tech graduated:

- 89% of its students on time (14 percentage points above the District average, tying with Grant and trailing only Wilson (90%) and Lincoln (94%);
- 86% of its African-American students on time (18 points above the District average);
- 94% of its Latino students on time (29 points above the average);
- 100% of its Hawaiian/Pacific Islander students on time (27 points above average); and
- 90% of its White students on time (10% points above the average).

The only grad rate in which Benson Tech trailed the District average was for Asian students, 84% on-time graduation compared to 85%. Benson Tech opens doors for students who would not otherwise succeed in school or in the workplace. It provides opportunities that are unique in the District and in the state. It plays a vital role in our regional economy. I believe Benson Tech needs to be expanded, not limited without a coherent goal and plan.
